EGG LAYING CONTEST

The sixth week of the 17th New Brunswick Egg Laying contest, conducted at the Dominion Experimental Station, was concluded on Dec. 12th, with a production of 340 eggs and 304.2 points. This is an average production for the week of 16.1 per cent. The Single Comb White Leghorns owned by Arthur Pringle, Stanley, led in production for the week with 34 eggs and 35.5 points. The Barred Rocks owned by Walter Dougan, of Hampstead, were in second position for the week with 35 eggs and 32.1 points. The Barred Rocks owned by A. T. Reed, Rollingdam, were in third position with 31 eggs and 28.5 points.

NOTICE OF ASSESSMENT

The Royal Gazette today contains a notice that under and by virtue of the powers conferred on the Workmen's Compensation Board by the Act, that every employer who shall engage in any of the industries under the Act shall be assessed at certain rates which appear in today's Gazette. The rates of assessment apply to industries such as mining, forest products manufacture and sale of various goods, construction, transportation. Every employer is required to furnish to the Board on or before the first day of January, 1937, an estimate of his probable payroll. The penalty for not complying with the regulation is \$500.

Residents of Marysville Unfairly Treated

CHANGES MAY BE MADE IN REGARD TO MAGISTRATES

To Place Magistrates on Salaries Entirely Instead of Fees

Centres Mentioned

May Also Enlarge Jurisdiction of Stipendiary Magistrates

It is understood that at the approaching session of the Legislature legislation may be introduced providing for the placing of police magistrates in the larger centres of the province on a strictly salary basis, and that the fees now received by these magistrates will be turned into the municipalities instead. It has been pointed out that whilst the fees to stipendiary magistrates in the smaller jurisdictions are not such as to make this practical that in the larger jurisdictions it would be the commonsense way of handling things.

It is stated that at the present time in some of the larger centres of the province that the magistrates' fees together with his salary, where they are paid a salary, gives that official an income which is even larger than that of a county court judge.

It has also been suggested that a rearrangement might be made whereby the magistrate's jurisdiction might be extended, especially in the smaller places, to cover a larger area and that a lesser number of magistrates might be appointed so that the arrangement would be more satisfactory to the various districts and that the individual magistrate would be suitably reimbursed for his work.

Two New Companies Formed in Province

Two new companies have been formed according to notice appearing in today's Royal Gazette. One is "Bardsley Hats, Limited," which will have capital stock of \$10,000 and head office at Saint John. Those incorporated are Alfred Bardsley, manufacturer; Catherine E. Bardsley, spinster, and Albert Warren, all of the city of Saint John. "Lovely Realities, Limited," also has been incorporated to carry on a general farming business and real estate business. Capital stock is \$10,000 and head office will be at Woodstock. Those incorporated are Herman E. Lovely, broker; Edith Lovely, wife of Herman E. Lovely, both of Woodstock, and Malcolm Lovely, contractor of Quebec.

"Bardsley Hats, Limited," will take over control of the business of the J. B. Bardsley Hat Company in Saint John.

FLURRY OF PLANES

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MARYSVILLE TOWN COUNCIL CHARGES DISCRIMINATION, UNFAIR TREATMENT OF RESIDENTS RE "NO PARKING" AREA

Fredericton City Council Informed Marysville They Could Not Enact By-Law to Remedy Situation -- Marysville Residents Bring Much Business Here--Dog Law Amendment Quashed.

The town council of Marysville at its December meeting last night in a resolution unanimously passed expressed disapproval of the apparent discrimination against, and unfair treatment of Marysville residents, in connection with a recent request made by that body before the Fredericton city council that provision be made in this city for "no parking" areas on Carleton street for the convenience of passengers using the bus service to and from Marysville, and Devon. The local council at the time the delegation appeared before it, it has informed the Marysville delegation, that Fredericton's city council had not the authority to enact a by-law to remedy the situation.

After discussion last night the Marysville town council passed the following resolution:

"Whereas at a recent meeting of the City Council at Fredericton, representatives of the Town Councils of Marysville and Devon waited upon the City Council of Fredericton with a request that provision should be made in the City of Fredericton for 'no parking' areas on Carleton Street for the convenience of passengers using the Bus Service to and from Marysville and Devon.

"And whereas it was pointed out that a large percentage of Marysville payrolls was expended in Fredericton, and that by reason of lack of suitable Bus Stops in Fredericton inconvenience was occasioned to the residents of Marysville and Devon using the Bus Service.

"And whereas the delegation from the two Towns was informed that the Fredericton City Council had not the authority to enact a by-law to remedy this situation.

"Therefore, be it resolved that this Council do express their disapproval of the apparent discrimination against, and unfair treatment of Marysville residents.

"And be it further resolved that a Copy of this Resolution be forwarded to the City Council of the City of Fredericton."

The attitude of the Marysville town council was that if the Fredericton city council (or is it the Police Commission?) can set aside signs for parking in several other areas, why cannot they do it for the benefit of the Marysville residents who bring a great deal of business here, and considerable of whose payrolls are spent in this city. Discussion last night disclosed that in October, 1935, Fredericton set aside, "no parking" areas for the Capital Transit, Ltd.

Dog Law Amendment Killed
The Marysville town council with Deputy Mayor H. R. Pettigrove presiding voted on the proposed amendment to the dog law and the amendment which would allow dogs to run at large from November to April, was defeated on a vote of 5 to 2. Dogs will be kept "tied up" as has been (Continued on Page Five)

Prov. Cabinet Swears Allegiance to New King

The provincial cabinet last night repudiated their loyalty to His Majesty King George VI at a special ceremony, in which the oath of allegiance was administered by His Honor, Lieutenant-Governor Dr. Murray MacLaren. The oath was administered also to County Court Judge A. R. Slipp and J. Bacon Dickson, clerk of the executive council. Hon. A. C. Taylor, the only cabinet minister absent, will take the oath of allegiance on his return to New Brunswick from Ottawa. Mr. Dickson assisted the Lieutenant-Governor who was attended by Major T. C. Barker, official secretary and aide-de-camp.

At the conclusion of the ceremony the cabinet held a brief meeting when His Honor signed several orders-in-council in connection with some proclamations. Several other matters were considered. The government adjourned and will not meet again until after the New Year. Premier Dymally, who will remain in the city for a few days, was busy at routine matters this morning.
