EARTH'S PRESSURE PRODUCES CHANGES

Increases Ability to Re-
sist Shearing -- Causes
Crystalline Shift

What happens to those materials
which lie buried hundreds of miles
deep down in the earth? How may
scientists expect them to behave?

One hundred miles down, the pres-
sure is almost 1,000,000 pounds per
square inch. It might seem to be ask-
ing a lot of laboratory equipment
that it should stand any strain such
as this.

Prof. P. W. Bridgman of Harvard
university, however, has developed
apparatus that 'can take it.' He is
able to put a piece of some substance
into his machine and then watch what
would happen to it if it were 100
miles underground.

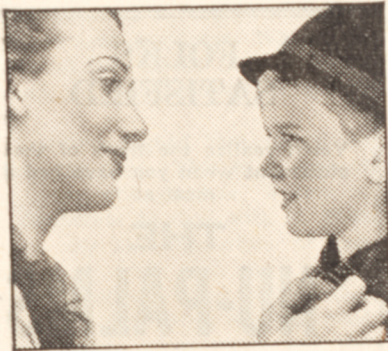
The two principal features of high
pressure behavior which Prof. Bridg-
man emphasizes are:

1. The ability of materials to resist
'shearing' force is increased many
times by very high pressures. Shear
is that type of force which tries to
make one part of a solid material
slide over another part.

2. The high pressures cause about
one-third of all materials to undergo a
change of crystalline form. It was
formerly believed that such changes
were relatively rare.

LISTENING TO CRITICISM A DISTASTEFUL SITUATION

Ruth Cameron Cites the Embarrassing Position of
a Woman Fated to Become the Third Side of
An Odd Triangle in "Friendships"

Here's an odd quandary that a
friend presented to me.

Or perhaps not so odd.

You see what you think.

"What do you do," she asks, "when
you have two friends who on the sur-
face are friends of each other, but
who continually criticize and make
fun of each other to you. You like
them both, what do you do? Do you
listen or close your ears? Do you
agree or disagree? Do you try to keep
them both, or what?"

I said it was an odd quandary.

As I write it out, I see that it is
probably not so odd at least not in
the sense of the unusual.

Odd in the sense of a queer thing
for those friends to do, yes. Let me
say right now that I think it wretched
taste for people to do that sort of
thing and I can't see why they do it.
If each friend knows that she likes
the other, each must know that she
puts her listener in an uncomfortable
position when she criticizes and
makes fun. Each knows, she must
know, that she is embarrassing her
listener, and why do it? Let them
have what opinions they choose to
and express them if they wish to
others who are not close friends of
the person they criticize.

As to what the centre point in this
friendship tangle shall do, I'm puzzled
myself.

If she agrees with each when the
other is criticized, she might win pop-

ularity (unless they are the sort of
people who would tell each other
what she said, and I wouldn't put it
by them) but she will lose her self-
respect.

If she disagrees and champions the
other whenever criticized she will
certainly arouse antagonism. Speak-
ing well of people behind their backs
may be a fine thing to do, but it is
pretty sure to make people sore when
they want to speak ill.

Or she can decide which of the
friends she wants most to keep, and
just drop the other, thus getting rid
of the triangle.

Or she can tell them both that she
doesn't like to talk about the other,
that she likes them both and is made
uncomfortable by that sort of thing,
and see what happens.

Maybe some reader friend can tell
us how she has satisfactorily dealt
with such a situation. Let's hear.

On looking back I see that I said
above one thing that I don't wholly
mean.

I said I didn't see why on earth
those two friends feel it necessary to
criticize each other to her. Well, in a
way I do see. I think there is down
underneath a motive they would hate
to acknowledge, because none of us
like to acknowledge that particular
motive, and generally can find some
camouflage for it to ourselves and to
others. The green eyed monster is
not a guest that any of us like to ad-
mit harboring. But I think he is
there and at the root of more criti-
cism, more trouble, more maladjust-
ment than most of us realize.

TAFFY APPLES

Four to six firm red apples, 2 cups
brown sugar, 1/2 teaspoon light corn
syrup, 1/2 cup water, 1 teaspoon but-
ter, 1/2 teaspoon lemon extract.

Method: Put a sharp stick, 4 to 5
inches long in the centre of each
washed apple. Cook together the sug-
ar, syrup and water until a little drop
ped in cold water forms a firm ball
(260 degrees F.). Remove from the
fire, add butter and extract and dip
apples in the syrup while it is hot.
Place on buttered pan to harden.

CHEAP RATES FOR CHRISTMAS, NEW YEAR GREETINGS

MONTREAL, Oct. 23—According to
an announcement made today by the
Canadian Pacific Telegraphs and the
Canadian National Telegraphs, Christ-
mas and New Year greeting telegrams
of pre-arranged message texts will be
available to the public this year at
rates of twenty-five and forty cents.

Greeting messages within Eastern
Canada, or within Western Canada
and from points in Eastern and West-
ern Canada to points in the U.S.A.
are accepted at forty cents. These
rates are subject to government tax.
The remarkable growth of holiday
greeting telegrams in recent years is
attributable to the fact that such mes-
sages are individually delivered on
colorful blanks by telegraph messen-
gers on Christmas Eve or Christmas
Day at the height of festivities.

It is expected that the low rates
announced will result in a tremendous
increase in the volume of both per-
sonal and business holiday greeting
telegrams. A wide selection of sug-
gested texts are available for this
purpose and both the telegraph com-
panies are arranging to take care of
the increased volume of holiday traffic
which is expected to result following
the announcement of the new low
rates.

National Parks Draw 672,624

OTTAWA, Oct. 24—Soaring popu-
larity of Canada's national parks is
evidenced by figures for motor tour-
ist traffic issued today by Hon. T.
A. Crerar, Minister of the Interior,
for the six months ended Sept. 30.

For all points where a record of
motor travel is maintained the total
of visiting motorists reached a figure
of 672,624, an increase of 81,570, or
14 per cent from 591,054 in the same
months of 1935.

Gains of from 7 to 55 per cent were
registered. Point Pelee, in Ontario,
attracted the largest number of mo-
torists, with 260,140 against 242,140 in
the corresponding period last year.
