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SOME REASONS WHY U. S. LOST TO AUSTRALIA

George Daley Comments on the Recent Davis Cup Matches

NEW YORK, June 11—All credit is due Crawford and Adrian Quist of Australia, for putting the United States Davis Cup Team out of the running for the cup we have been trying to recapture for ten years, but shivers are still creeping up and down my spine.

That defeat in the combination which the match hinged, seems inexcusable. Having established what appeared to be our superiority, the crash came, due in part from all accounts, to a bit of poaching on the part of Gene Mako.

It may be said that Australia's two-man team beat our one-man team. Donald Budge alone stood up.

Wilmer Allison was not at his best, except in spots, and Mako lacked the needed experience for a pressure match. The United States has sunk to its lowest tennis level.

Still there should be no repining and yet there seems to be plenty of it, judging by letters which have cluttered up my desk the last few days. The bricks and the barbs are being directed largely at the Davis Cup committee for what is called "stupid blunders" or "bad judgment" or "prejudiced views" or some other extravagant phrase.

Second guessing is so easy. Naturally Byron (Bitsy) Grant has a big following and much of the criticism is directed at the Davis Cup committee for failing to name him for one of the single assignments in place of Allison. But who can tell that the result would have been different?

If Grant had been chosen and our team beaten the same howl would have been raised because the committee had not picked Allison who had been through the fire of Davis Cup competitions and is a No. 1 ranking player. The growlers are always with us.

Some Reasons Why

For my part, admiration must always go to the horse or the human who comes from behind to win. Skill alone will not prevail. Courage and the competitive spirit under stress are important. Under pressure, Jack Crawford rose to the occasion and carried through, and we should be applauding him and admitting freely that the best team, under all conditions, won. Results are the final answer.

Still in any competition, so close, where comparatively minor things have a bearing and loom large, there is bound to be discussion and criticism. There is only one answer to those who are heaping the blame on the Davis Cup committee. No set of men could have done any better in choosing from the players available.

It is impossible to quote from all the letters of criticism, but let me say to Peter Webb that Sidney Wood was not available because of an operation for appendicitis last winter, and to William Mitchell that Frank Parker stuck to his schooling this spring and did not go out for the team.

To Charles Parsons let this be said. Budge and Mako beat Allison and Van Ryn in California last Fall and spring four times in tournament play this spring and under the circumstances the Davis Cup committee was justified in leaving Van Ryn off the team.
