TO SHOW PICTURES

Prior to the April committee meeting of the city council in the mayor's office of the city hall this evening the aldermen will have the opportunity of seeing motion pictures of Fredericton. ANOTHER REMAND

McCullough, of Saint John, charged with obtaining money under false pretence was remanded to jail until May 1. Application by the prisoner for bail is being considered. McCullough was brought here from Woodstock about a month ago by the city police.

CLASSES CONFIRMED

His Grace Most Rev. J. A. Richardson, Archbishop of Fredericton, confirmed two classes in Saint John yesterday, one in St. Jude's church and the other in St. George's church in West Sain John. The candidates were presented by the rectors, Rev. Norman P. Fairweather in St. Jude's and Rev. W. P. Haigh in St. George's. This evening His Grace is officiating at confirmation in St. Luke's church at Saint John.

WANT TREES PLANTED

The city council will urge upon the Local Improvement Association that trees be planted inside the fence on the Provincial Normal School grounds as a step to beautify Queen Street. These will substitute for two trees, which were recently cut down on Queen Street. Should Queen Street be widened five feet as is proposed to relieve the parking problem, the possibility is that more trees will have to be cut down.

"KNUCKER" IRVINE HOME

Charlie "Knucker" Irvine, well known Devon athlete, and one of the best skaters and hockey players ever produced in this part of the province, returned last week from Syracuse, N. Y., where he finished the past hockey season with that club. "Knucker" started the season as the fifteenth man with Toronto Maple Leafs but suffered a broken wrist while training and was out of play for some time. He played for a time with New Haven along with Bill Miller and later went to Syracuse in the Canadian-American loop, where he has played the past six weeks. In twenty games which he played he scored 26 points—an impressive performance. The unfortunate injury to his wrist and later a charley horse put him out of play for about eight weeks of the season. "Knucker" told The Daily Mail today that he will report to the Toronto Maple Leafs next season. He will remain here during the summer months.

PALM SUNDAY

Yesterday, Palm Sunday, was observed in the churches of Fredericton and vicinity with the usual pre-Easter accent in the sermons. The members of the local detachment of the R.C.M.P. together with members from the Maritimes and Quebec, paraded in a body, in the morning, some attending St. Dunstan's church, and the others going to the Christchurch Cathedral. There was special mention by the clergy of each church to the visit of the "Mounties." Large congregations attended. At the Christchurch Parish church the morning service was broadcast over C.F.N.B. The respective clergymen paid respects to the police as the upholders of law and order in the province. At St. Andrew's Presbyterian church Rev. Dr. Kierstead spoke in the morning and there was a musical service in the evening. Mrs. Webster and Hargrove Locke sang a duet and R. M. Webber played on the violin. The regular minister, Rev. Dr. G. E. Ross is still absent from the city, being under treatment at Boston.

IMPROVEMENT IN QUEEN STREET TRAFFIC URGED

Council to Consider Widening Street, Carleton to York

Other Plan Suggested

Likely to Act on Matter First Brought Up by The Daily Mail

Improvement in parking conditions on Queen street is likely to result from a recommendation to be made to the city council at its April committee meeting this evening, by Ald. David McCaughy, chairman of the Roads and Streets committee.

The council, it is understood, will consider the suggestion that the block on Queen Street from Carleton to York be widened five feet on the river side in order to facilitate traffic, which is at the present time greatly congested especially on Saturdays. This suggestion was first passed along by The Daily Mail about a year ago.

Action is Necessary

The necessity for some such action was impressed on the aldermen on Saturday when they had occasion to travel by bus on Queen Street and saw at first-hand the difficulty under which traffic is regulated on Queen street. The aldermen seemed generally agreed that more parking space on Queen street is necessary.

Such a change in the opinion of Ald. P. S. Mundle would make a tremendous improvement to traffic conditions on Queen street. Ald. Mundle claims he made the suggestion himself several times but nothing was done about it.

Another Plan Offered

Ald. T. Earle Dooan offers another solution to the Queen street parking problem. He contends that if the Canadian Legion square was "filled in" to the level of Queen Street it would be a good parking ground and might solve the problem. He wonders if the permission of the Legion could be obtained for this or if the ground could be deeded to the city. Ald. Dooan believes that the filling in could be done cheaply and that the earth could be obtained at the time that the new C.N.R. proposed trestle work was being done. Labor would be available and the cost would not be high. This may also be considered by the city council at tonight's meeting.

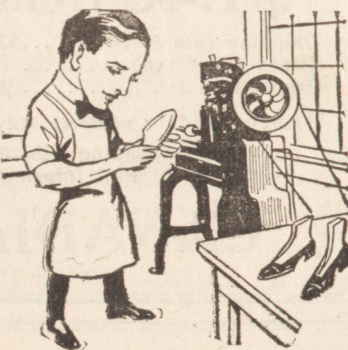
D & D Auction Attracts Bargain Hunters For Used Cars

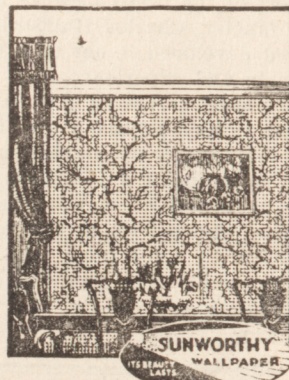

ELECTRIC MOTORS AT PUMPING STA. OPERATE AGAIN

Had Been Out of Use Since Freshet Here on March 19

Steam Plant Was Used

Water Level Dropping at Rate of Six Inches Per Day

Renovations which have been carried on at the Fredericton pumping station ever since the record-breaking freshet here several weeks ago, reached a satisfactory point on Saturday evening when the engineers got the electric motors back into operation and were able to discontinue the use of the steamplant which had been enforced since the freshet peak.

John Malloy, veteran engineer at the pumping station stated today that the plant is now back to its normal routine with full adjustments made to the plant. There was no damage to the electric motors, although they were for a time out of commission because of the water height. Only two motors escaped the water on the night of Thursday, March 19, when the freshet was at its peak.

Water Has Been Bad

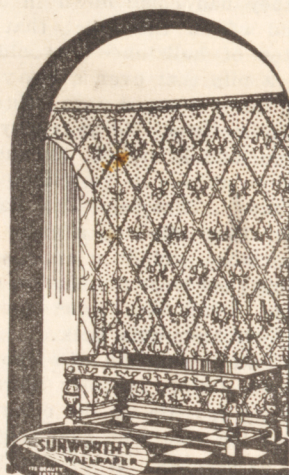
The steamplant facilities have been used for a period of fifteen days. Mr. Malloy states further that the city's supply of water is now almost back to normal again. For the past two weeks the citizens have had to endure water that has been of bad taste because of the heavy use of chemicals. In recent days the water has cleared up considerably, however.

The water level at this point dropped eight more inches over the past weekend and was continuing to drop slowly today.
