### "Within the Empire"

Honor will be paid to the memory of one of the greatest social reformers of Great Britain, when George Young presents "Within the Empire" for the CBC national network listeners on Friday, Dec. 4, at 9:00 p.m. The name of Elizabeth Fry, the great philanthropist of the early Nineteenth Century who tackled the problem arising from the shocking prison conditions which existed in England at that time, is known to all students of social and political reform.

Perhaps countless thousands who have benefited by the zealous and courageous campaign which this gentle woman waged remained in ignorance of her benefactress, but this little Quaker lady holds her niche in British history with such women as Florence Nightingale.

An orchestra under the baton of Geoffrey Waddington will furnish typical music of the period and a dramatic cast will enact the story of "Elizabeth Fry," who started her mission in Newgate Prison, foulest of all jails in Britain when she set out to get a square deal for criminals and miscreants of the early 1800's.

## Interest to Women

### WOMEN IN LADY ASTOR'S OPINION ARE THE KEY TO CIVILIZATION

TORONTO, Dec. 2.—A plea to Canadian women to use their influence in all spheres to further civilization by tearless crusading of Christian standards was delivered by Lady Astor, first woman member of the British House of Commons, to a luncheon meeting of the Women's Canadian Club of Toronto at the Royal York Hotel Saturday.

Her address sparkled with humor, contained nonsense and a great deal of common sense, and kept an audience of more than 1,000 spellbound from the moment she rose to speak until the thunderous applause at its close.

Slight, little more than five feet tall, and dressed in neat and becoming dark purple, the British peeress and feminist spoke with traditional audacity, dropped the 'g's' from 'ing' endings with utter disregard of purists, and figuratively snapped her fingers in the face of usual speaker conventions.

She told them how pleased she and her husband had been to give their home at Cliveden, Taplow, to the Canadian Red Cross for a hospital during the war, and sketched in vivid picturesque language such incidents as the first Christmas party, when 'our house being a bit impressive' she had sought to break the ice of shy Canadian soldiers by demanding the setting up of poker tables.

"It was a very remarkable hospital," she said, fluttering her small hands and grinning. "They made me a colonel, and Colonel Mewburn and I ran it. He was never officially the head and neither was I, but we were always the head although the others thought they were."

She described how she badgered the patients, told them to make up

their minds to live or die, described the visit of the King and Queen and how she earned to say 'guts' and 'Wipers' and shocked Lord Balfour by doing so. In the 4½ years of war 24,000 men went through the hospital, and declared Lady Astor, her correspondence now places her in a position "where I know more what is going on in the minds of Canadian than their political leaders."

"We weren't a bit sentimental," she said. "I remember we were sitting around the stove one day and the men were spitting, spitting, and I said that when the war was over I was so sick of men I wanted to go to the old ladies' home. Well, when I was elected to the House of Commons I got a letter from one of them, one of your Canadians, and he said to me, 'Well, you got your wish!'"

But she launched into a more serious vein.

She said she believed women could influence any man and they should use this influence to better the world.

"Believe me you and I are the key to civilization, because civilization depends on character and I think character depends upon the right concept of God and following in the steps, so far as we can see them, of our Lord Jesus Christ. I have never seen a better message than He gave and I have never seen a better civilization than the Anglo Saxon concept. We may not read it but our ancestors read the Bible and it gave us a way of thinking."

"I'm not saying the Anglo Saxon is a race of angels, but I ask you where is freedom today and is it not true that it only continues where you have the Anglo Saxon way of government and way of living?"

### Prime Minister and Colleagues on Home Improvement Plan

Of interest to Canadians throughout the country will be a half hour of brief broadcast talks by the Prime Minister and Members of the Federal Government and the Chairman of the National Employment Commission, on the subject of the National Home Improvement Plan, to be heard over the Canadian Broadcasting Corporation's National network on Thursday evening, Dec. 3, from 8:30 to 9:00 p.m. The speakers for this broadcast are: The Right Hon. W. L. Mackenzie King, Hon. Ernest Lapointe, Hon. C. A. Dunning, Hon. Norman Rogers, and Arthur B. Purvis, Chairman of the National Employment Commission. Each speaker will talk for five minutes. They will tell of the Federal Government's plan being carried out in co-operation with the banks and other institutions for the improvement and modernization of Canadian homes, and of the improvement in the employment situation the plan is designed to effect. This broadcast is of national importance.

### Network News Notes

Kate Smith will journey to Detroit, Tuesday, Dec. 8, to serve as guest artist on Ben Bernie's NBC broadcast. Incidentally, Kate and Bernie were among the first radio entertainers to appear on each other's broadcasts more than five years ago. Kate's appearance with the comedian next Tuesday will mark the first reunion of the two stars since that time.

Eddie Cantors' talk to the Junior Birdmen of America at their rally in the Radio City Music Hall, New York, Saturday, Dec. 12, will be broadcast over a coast-to-coast NBC hookup, beginning at 9:00 a.m.

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### Mal Stevens, N.Y.U. Coach, On Kate Smiths Programme

Mal Stevens, coach of the New York University eleven, which defeated Fordham in one of the major upsets of the football season, and Smith and Dale, comedy team, will appear on Kate Smith's Bandwagon show, Thursday, Dec. 3, at 8:00 p.m., EST, over the WABC-CBS network.

Stevens will be the fifth football coach to be interviewed by Ted Collins, Kate's announcer-manager, on the weekly broadcasts. The programme also will feature the Command Appearance and nominations for the heroism award. In addition, there will be songs by the star, accompanied by Jack Miller's orchestra. The Three Ambassadors and the LeBrun Sisters will contribute harmony numbers.

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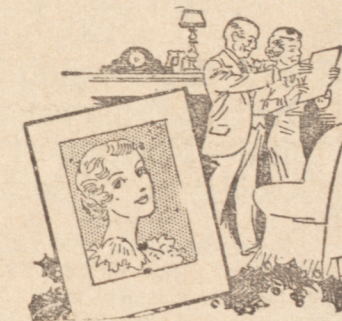
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Send a ship to China for ivory and jade,
