EXODUS OF CANADIANS TO OLD COUNTRY

If It Keeps Up There'll Be No Hockey Players Left in Canada

MONTREAL, Oct. 5.—Canadian fans may have to take a trip over to Europe to see the national game if the exodus of Canadian hockey players continues at its present pace.

Fifty or more players have already left to play with English and continental teams and today another contingent left Montreal for the ice of overseas arenas.

Dr. J. C. Ethier, well-known local amateur, led a group of 17 players from Montreal, Quebec and neighborhood who sailed on the Duchess of Bedford.

In this group were Hugh Farquharson, (Kick) McCann, Donat Laclelle, Wilbert Landrymore, Jerry Philbin, Leonard Godin, Richard Proulx, Roger Gaudette, Dollard Bellemeur, Roger Belisle, Antonio Demers, Lionel Lafontaine, Paul Armand, Theo Hamel, Maurice Guerin and Urie Tondreau, Romeo Sequin, James Borland, James Kelly, Gordon Poirier, Johnny Tauger and Vincent Gallagher, the latter from Kenora.

Johnny Tauger decided at the last minute to sail with the party. Representative of Quebec Aces hurried to Montreal yesterday in an effort to persuade Tauger to return to Quebec, but they were evidently unsuccessful. Stan Brodeur, however, did an about-face at the gangplank and didn't go aboard, though he had his ticket and passport.

Hughie Farquharson will play in Paris after all. Early this week he considered joining a team in England due to the sudden devaluation of the franc. Later, it appears, Farquharson arranged to have his "expenses" paid in Canadian currency.

Sequin, Tauger, Poirier, Gallagher, Kelly and Borland will play with Don Penniston's Brighton team. Penniston sails from New York next Wednesday on the Queen Mary with four more players. Clint Benedict and Player Hiller sail tomorrow on the Montcalm. Vince Gallagher is a brother of Johnny, who played here with the M.A.A.A., C.P.R. and Maroons.

Yanks Take Giants Through, 2-1 and 5-2

WINNERS PROVE HUBBELL IS NOT INVINCIBLE

Need One More Win to Take the Series

NEW YORK, Oct. 4.—Not even the hitherto invincible Carl Hubbell could silence the heavy artillery of the Yankees today, with the result the world series hopes of the Giants came tumbling down with the shattered remains of the celebrated southpaw's winning streak.

The American League champions beat Hubbell and the Giants 5-2 for their third straight conquest and moved rapidly in the direction of the world championship.

The home run king of the majors, Captain Gehrig of the Yankees, beat the king of the southpaw pitchers with a home run into the right-field bleachers in the third inning. This circuit clout, with Red Rolfe on base, climaxed an attack that produced four runs in two innings and clinched the ball game.

Far from the peak of effectiveness he reached in halting the Yankees on opening day, Hubbell was battered for eight hits in the seven frames he worked before giving way to a pinch-hitter. The great southpaw lacked his customary control, and his screwball held none of the baffling mysteries, for the Yankees' "Murderers' Row," that it did last Wednesday.

Thus the Yankees, who had their own world series streak of 12 consecutive games broken by Hubbell, got ample revenge by handing the ace of the Giants his first setback since last July 13. The slender Oklahoman had rolled up 17 consecutive triumphs.

Behind the highly-effective right-hand speedball flinging of Monte Pearson, who took the spotlight after recovering from a lame back, the Yankees took almost complete command of New York's baseball war.

Leading now by three games to one, the American League champions need only one more victory to clinch their fourth world series in successive tries.

SUNDAY'S GAME
NEW YORK, Oct. 4.—The greatest crowd in world series history till today, 64,842 fans who filled the expansive Yankee Stadium nearly to capacity, saw the Yankees capitalize the breaks of the third game in New York's baseball war Saturday to beat the Giants 2-1 despite the spectacular four-hit hurling of Fred Fitzsimmons, 35-year-old, chicken farmer and exponent of the baffling knuckle ball.

Fitzsimmons, rated one of the best fielding pitchers in baseball, lost a heart-breaking duel to his right-handed rival, Irving (Bump) Hadley, because he failed to hold a sharply hit grounder by Frankie Crosetti in the critical climax of the eighth inning rally.

Home runs into the right-field stands by Lou Gehrig, the Yankee captain, and Jimmy Ripple, freshman centrefield of the Giants from Montreal, carried the most exciting match of the series all square into the 8th inning before the last of a series of tough breaks turned against the National League champions.

There were two out, with Yankee base-runners on first and third as Crosetti faced Fitzsimmons. After taking two called strikes the Yankee shortstop hit sharply to the right of the pitcher's box.

Burgess Whitehead, second sacker of the Giants, probably could have handled the ball easily for the third out but Fitz darted for the ball and got his glove in the way of it. It was so hard hit, however, that it caromed off. Before Fitz could retrieve it, Crosetti was safe for a scratch base hit and Jake Powell was scampering across the plate with what proved the winning run.

It was the biggest "break" of the game that saw the Giants outthit the Yankees, 11-4 only to let scoring chances escape due to their own poor strategy, lack of a wallop in the pinches, or the defensive skill of the home club.

The team that simply slaughtered five of the Giants' pitchers Friday to the record-breaking tune of 18-4 won the crucial third match of the series because it was the better defensive club. The home-run hitting hero of the second game, Tony Lazzeri, be-

URBANA, Ill., Oct. 4.—George Huff, 64, veteran director of athletics at the University of Illinois and widely known in sports circles, died here today after a short illness from an abdominal ailment.

Huff was stricken several weeks ago and an operation was decided upon last Saturday. His condition took a fatal turn this morning. His wife and children were at his bedside when he died.

He left the university in 1907 to become manager of the Boston Americans baseball team, but resigned immediately, after arriving in Boston and returned to his alma mater.
