MSGR. CARNEY TO WELCOME NEW BISHOP

Bishop Elect Bray to be Consecrated on May 21

Ceremony at St. John Arrive St. John on May 13 and Receive Formal Welcome

Rt. Rev. Msgr. F. L. Carney, D. P., administrator of the Diocese of Saint John since the death of the late Rt. Rev. Bishop LeBlanc will continue to carry on until the consecration of Rt. Rev. P. A. Bray, the new Bishop of Saint John, which will take place at the Cathedral at Saint John on Thursday, May 21. Monsignor Carney will read the address of welcome to the new bishop when the latter arrives in Saint John from Halifax on May 13. The consecrating prelate will be Most Rev. William M. Duke, Archbishop of Vancouver, and the co-consecrators will be Rt. Rev. James Morrison, bishop of Antigonish and Rt. Rev. P. A. Chaisson, bishop of Chatham. The sermon will be given by Rt. Rev. J. A. O'Sullivan, bishop of Charlottetown.

Bishop-Elect Bray will arrive in St. John, from Halifax Wednesday, May 13, at 6:20 p.m. He will be met at Moncton by Rt. Rev. Edward Savage, D.P. and Rt. Rev. H. Cormier, who, with other clergy, will accompany him to Saint John.

The Diocesan welcome will take place that evening in the Cathedral at 8 o'clock. The address from the clergy will be read by Rt. Rev. F. L. Carney, D. P., Administrator of the Diocese, since the death of Bishop LeBlanc, and that for the laity by Dr. W. P. Broderick, Saint John.

With the announcement of the date of the consecration of the new Bishop of Saint John, plans are now being made to extend the heartiest of welcomes to His Excellency who for the past six years has been Superior of Holy Heart Seminary, Halifax. Full details of the welcoming programme are not complete, but the Bishop-Elect, on his arrival, will be met at the depot, officially, by Very Rev. Dean J. J. McDermott, pastor of Saint John the Baptist Church, and Rev. H. F. Gillen, Rector of the Cathedral.

His Excellency will be escorted to the Episcopal Residence, Waterloo Street, where he will be formally met by Rt. Rev. F. L. Carney, D.P., Administrator of the Diocese, and the clergy of the Diocese.

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Ald. Pettigrove of Marysville is Fair Wage Officer

Ald. Horace R. Pettigrove of Marysville, York County, has been appointed Fair Wage Officer under the provisions of legislation adopted at the recent meeting of the Legislature authorizing an Act Respecting Fair Wages for Workmen.

The Act will be administered by the Minister of Health and Labour. Ald. Pettigrove is at present in Saint John making a study of the administration of relief.

SUMMER COLONY FOR OXFORD GROUP BODY

F. B. Vrooman, of Chenoa, Illinois, author, lecturer and traveller, one of a distinguished family of authors arrived in the city with a three-fold plan.

First, he intends to secure a quiet spot in which to contemplate the writing of a volume on Dante, famous Italian poet. Secondly he wishes to establish a summer colony in this province for the benefit of members of the Oxford Group Movement. And thirdly he will, in co-operation with his brother, Rev. Hiram Vrooman, of Chicago, and Hon. Carl Vrooman, one time candidate for the presidency of the United States, establish farm holdings in New Brunswick.

Commenting on this ambitious programme to a reporter of The Daily Mail today, Mr. Vrooman said he had been planning the venture for three years. He has spent two summers travelling by car in Quebec and Ontario, searching for a suitable location for a summer colony open to Oxford Group members. The location must combine some good sport and some farming. No such location was found in Ontario, where the farming was not in proximity to fishing haunts. "New Brunswick has by far the best outlook", he said.

This unusual visitor has spent some time in western Canada and is considered an authority on the economic geography of Canada west. Mr. Vrooman is a lecturer at Oxford on this subject and he stated today that he thing which seemed to interest the British people most, both in the press and on the platform was an account of his trip through western Canada in 1900. This noted traveller is the only living person to come down the Findley and Peace Rivers from Fort Graham on a fifty-foot raft. He put five men and seven horses on the raft on that memorable trip, the feat being performed at great risk of life. Mr. Vrooman is a Fellow of the Royal Geographical Society and has been of

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BRUCE SALT'S BODY RECOVERED THIS MORNING

Drowning Victim Had Been in Water Since 2.30 Saturday

No Inquest

18-Year-Old Son of Major or Salt Met Tragic Death

Gloom was cast over the city on Saturday at the death by drowning of Bruce Salt, son of Major E. C. P. Salt and Mrs. Salt. Friends everywhere will sympathize with the family in their tragic bereavement.

The body of Bruce Salt was recovered old son of Major E. C. P. Salt, superintendent of 'J' Division, New Brunswick, of the R.C.M.P., was recovered from the waters of the St. John river at 6.50 o'clock this morning after extensive efforts since Saturday afternoon at three o'clock at which time young Salt and Sub-Constable C. E. Potter, aged 21, were forced to leave a sinking rowboat and attempt to swim for shore.

The Daily Mail carried the story of the tragedy on Saturday.

The body was actually located by Chief Petty Officer Edward T. McGinnis of the Marine section of the R.C.M.P. at Saint John who was brought here to assist in the recovery of the body. The body was found at 6.50 o'clock this morning by the use of grappling irons, and the body was taken from somewhere near the middle of the river, opposite the mouth of the Nashwaakasis river.

With Petty Officer McGinnis were J. J. Leonard, E.R.A., and Patrick Jones, A.B., both of whom assisted in the recovery of the body of young Salt this morning.

Dr. Charles MacKay, coroner, investigated the circumstances of the drowning this morning and decided

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
