KING EDWARD VIII TAKES OATH ACCESSION **TODAY WILL FOLLOW FATHER'S FOOTSTEPS**

King Edward VIII Takes Oath Accession Today

Solitary Throne For Bachelor King, Chair of Queen and Prince of Wales Removed.

Will Follow Father's Footsteps

King Edward VIII. is the First British King to Be a Flier

LONDON, Jan. 22-Amid historic ceremony, the new King swore the solemn oath of accession to become "Edward VIII by the grace of God, of Great Britain, Ireland and the British dominions beyond the seas, King, Defender of the Faith, Emperor of India."

Then he received the pledge of fealty from members of Parliament. Before the privy council of the realm, recalling King George's unswerving devotion to constitutional government, he proclaimed:

"In this I am determined to follow my father's footsteps and work as he did throughout his life for the happiness and welfare of all classes of my subjects."

While the world mourned him, the body of George V, the Empire's beloved King who at the age of 70 died last night, lay before the altan in the parish church at Sandringham. Through the sleet and rain, the simple oak coffin was carried on a hand bier by a detachment of Grenadier Guards to the church. The body will be taken to London Thursday to lie in state at historic Westminster Hall until next Tuesday, when it will be taken to Windsor for final services in St. George's Chapel.

Breaks Tradition

On the first day of his reign King Edward broke tradition by travelling the 100 miles from Sandringham by air. becoming the first British King ever to make a journey by airplane. The machine was flown by the King's private pilot.

The Canadian Broadcast

Those who have been listening to the Canadian Radio Commission broadcasts during the past couple of days cannot help but admire the dignified way in which the programmes have been carried out, in keeping with the sad atmosphere that is prevailing throughout Canada in common with other parts of the Empire. On the evening of the late King's death the sad announcement was made over the radio after which the stations signed off and the balance of the programme was suspended. Last evening the music on the radio was solemnly appropriate. This is as it should be.

It is time that we in Canada, in a general way, took a leaf out of the book of Great Britain in regard to radio programmes. Our radio system in Canada is as some one has said "a mess". We are too much apt to copy the United States. Over in England the radio or "the wireless" as the Old Country papers call it, is entirely under the control of the government. There is no such thing as private stations which advertise cheap drugs, soaps and other merchandise. There is no trash in the way of music and no cheap stuff which has made the American radio disgusting. The United States radio has become commercialized until no person, unless he is looking for cheap trash wants to listen in. Our Canadian radio is gradually getting just the same way. The people are paying a license for their radio and are entitled to service. Instead they are being deluged with cheap advertising. If a salesman comes to your door and you do not wish to hear his talk on brushes, soap or floor mops you tell him so as politely as possible. You are compelled to listen in on some salesman pushing his wares over the radio. The time is coming when radio broadcasting must be taken up by the government and the people given some measure of protection for which they are paying their license fee. The radio should be handled in the interests of all the people of Canada, not for the benefit of advertising of cheap outfits. The whole radio business should be gone into. Some people are making too much money out of the thing. The present commission should be abolished and an nonpolitical body appointed in its place. As one paper recently said "Silly programmes should be eliminated-radio advertising should get the axe." The ether waves should carry information and splendid music rather than talks about some store which sells merchandise.


