DENY REPORT THAT BALDWIN IS RETIRING

LONDON, England, April 9 — No credence should be given to the rumors regarding the imminent retirement of Premier Stanley Baldwin, it is stated in semi-official quarters here. The Daily Mail said yesterday that Mr. Baldwin would retire immediately owing to increasing deafness. It is stated, however, that he has no intention of resigning immediately, though he has already signified that he has no intention of fighting another general election as head of the Conservative Party. This is taken to mean that he will retire after the coronation.

shares for an advance but not for more than is due to himself. He has no right to expose his clients' property to the contingencies of his own solvency. The broker must at all times have on hand sufficient stocks to satisfy his contracts. It is the rule governing principle and agent; and the duty of the latter to preserve and be constantly ready with correct accounts of all his dealings and transactions in the course of his agency, and to exercise such skill and diligence as is usual or necessary for the proper performance of the duties undertaken by him.

"You are a young man of ability and energy. Integrity is the cornerstone of the financial structure. You sent out circular letters soliciting more business when E. A. Willis & Co., Ltd., was in an insolvent condition. Joseph S. Cyr handed over a great number of stocks with strict instructions that your office was only to appraise same and report to him, but these were actually dumped immediately on the market and the proceeds were appropriated. Out of other transactions with Cyr in 15 the stocks were never bought, yet he was kept informed that your office was holding them for him.

"Other clients suffered similar experiences, in that your monthly statements falsified their position. Large sums were sent from the Campbellton office when you were manager to Saint John and other offices, the proceeds of clients' stock wrongfully converted.

Should Have Made Sure

"You claim you felt that E. A. Willis at all times could protect the position of his company. The proper course would have been to make sure that the business of your office from day to day was on a sound basis. In our modern developments financing by way of bonds and stocks is the system whereby capital is raised. Our brokerage houses should, and do when properly conducted, command the same respect as our banks. Fraudulent transactions on the market shakes the financial fabric and breeds distrust. "You are still young, the world I believe will hear from you in the years that are ahead. That honesty is the best policy, is a motto that every young man could well nail to the mast

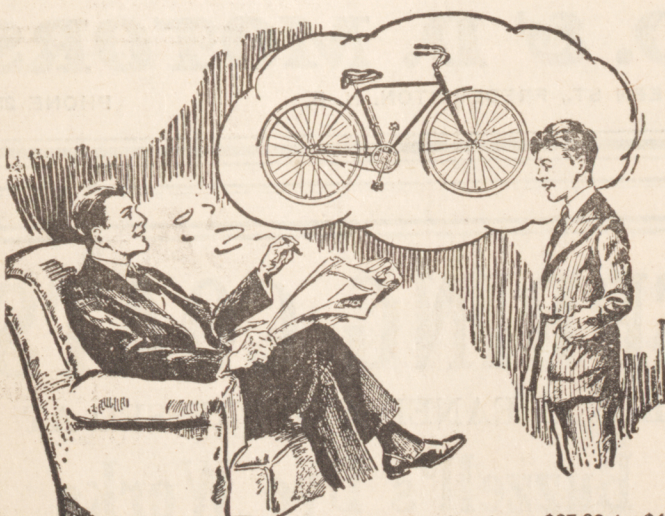
