IMPAIRMENT IN TRAIN SERVICE TO BE DISCUSSED

Transport. Comm. of Bd. of Trade Tries to Find Corrective

Delay, Loss of Money

C.N.R. Bridge Washout Created Serious Freight Transportation Problem

The problem of disrupted train service with its attendant damage to freight service will be seriously discussed at a meeting of the Transportation committee of the Fredericton Board of Trade, scheduled for five o'clock this afternoon at the city club rooms.

Since March 19, when the Canadian National Railway bridge was washed out by the freshet, freight service has been seriously impaired, and it has been necessary to haul freight from the Union Station to South Devon and North Devon since that time. Delay and loss of money has resulted.

R. L. Phillips, chairman of the transportation committee of the Board of Trade announced today that the meeting would be held and that matters of immediate interest in conjunction with railway service will be discussed. It is understood that railway officials will be present and will discuss corrective measures with the transportation committee.

Trains Delayed Today

The present spring has witnessed more upsets in train schedules than any year for a long period of time. The record-breaking freshets through the province and in Maine has resulted in derailments, tracks washed out and all-round damage.

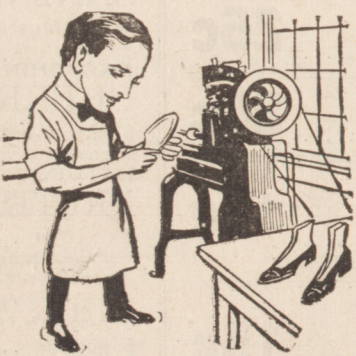
The Montreal train yesterday was delayed for hours by a derailment at Greenville Junction, Maine and the repair crews have only just got the line back into shape again. The Montreal train will be over an hour late today.

Impairment of the train service on the Maine Central this morning will mean that the Boston train will be over two hours late today.

Miss Eva Dedham, Devon Indian Girl, May Go to Rhode Island

Fine Elocutionist

Descendents of Other Famous Indians Also to Be Present

Miss Eva Dedham, a Devon Indian girl with rare gifts as an elocutionist is among those who have been invited to attend the big Tercentenary Indian Historic Pageant, "Rhode Island and Her Indians from the Unwritten Book of the Narragansetts", which will take place on July 4 and 5 at Camp Ki-Yi, Oakland, Rhode Island.

The features of this unusual entertainment by the Indians of Rhode Island include parade of Scouts and schools as well as the American Legion, exhibition of Indian art, crafts and relics. There will be noted chiefs to pledge their peace around the Narragansett Council fire.

According to an official notice of the forthcoming event sent to thousands of Indian ancestry there will be a sunrise service at six o'clock in the morning of July 4th "in the open hills around the Old Rugged Cross and will be in keeping with the Indian's faith in his Maker".

A Children's Hour, when a hundred Indian children will entertain, is also scheduled for one of the festive days.

Miss Dedham has not yet decided whether she will accept the invitation. A large number of Indian descendants famous in history, are among those who have received invitations.

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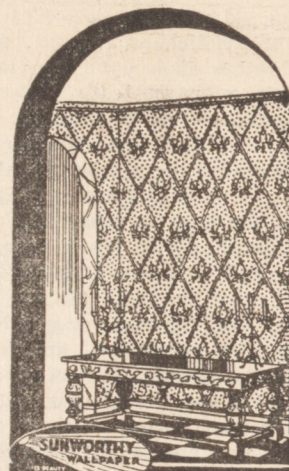
