BOND INVESTORS SHOW FAITH IN N. B. FINANCES

\$3,500,000 Bond Issue is Quickly Taken Up

Announced Today

\$2,000,000 2 3/4 p.c. 10-Year at 96.60 and \$1,500,000 at 3 p.c.

Three million, five hundred thousand dollars of a New Brunswick bond issue has been purchased, according to a statement given to The Daily Mail through the Provincial Secretary-Treasurer's office. Tenders closed yesterday and eight financial houses, headed by the Bank of Nova Scotia, took up the complete issue.

Two millions in 2 3/4 percent, 10-year debentures were sold at 96.60, at a cost to the province of 3.15 percent, and \$1,500,000 3 percent 15-year debentures at 94.50, at a cost to the province of 3.47 percent.

The group submitting the successful bid is composed of the Bank of Nova Scotia, the Dominion Bank, Gouinlock Co., Ltd., McLeod, Young, Weir & Co., Ltd., Mills, Spence & Co., Ltd., Cochrane, Murray & Co., Ltd., T. M. Bell & Co., Ltd., and Irving, Brennan & Company, Ltd.

The purpose of the debenture issue is to cover expenditures as follows: Floating debt, \$700,000; constructing government offices for old age pensions commission, motor vehicle branch and others, \$21,000; direct relief, \$300,000; New Brunswick Electric Power Commission, \$479,000; and hard surfaced roads, \$2,000,000.

One other tender was received, making a partial bid with an option on the balance, by a group composed of Bank of Montreal, Royal Bank of Canada, A. E. Ames & Company, Ltd., Wood, Gundy & Co., Ltd., Eastern Securities Co., Ltd., and Dominion Securities Corporation, Ltd.

"The cost of the 10-year series," said Mr. Richard, "is the lowest ever obtained on a New Brunswick issue and is two points below the figure secured for a similar amount and a similar term in June last, which at that time set a record. In the 15-year series the cost of 3.47 compares with a bid last December of 3.62 and, although we have had no 15-year debentures in recent years with which to make comparison, by every standard available, the record is just as good as in the 10-year series. "I feel," added Mr. Richard, "we have every reason to be satisfied, not only for completing a transaction that is eminently favorable to the province, but also because of demonstrated faith and confidence in the soundness of our provincial finances."

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U.N.B. ALUMNAE SOCIETY AWARDS NEW SCHOLARSHIP

Awarded to Miss Ardeth E. Robertson of This City

Value to Be \$100

To Commemorate Women Who First Entered U. N. B. in 1886

The University of New Brunswick Alumnae Society, in order to commemorate the women who entered the old "College on the Hill" for the first time fifty years ago, has this year given to that institution a new scholarship. It was announced this morning by Dr. C. C. Jones, president of the University.

The scholarship, to be known as the "Mary Kingsley Tibbitts" scholarship has a value of one hundred dollars. It was awarded to Miss Ardeth E. Robertson, daughter of Roy C. Robertson, 348 Charlotte street, this city, who has entered the University of New Brunswick as a freshman.

As far as is known, the scholarship is only good for this year. Whether or not it will be continued in future years is at present a matter of uncertainty.

It was fifty years ago this year that the University of New Brunswick was made co-educational, after eighty-six years of distinguished history as a strictly male institution. At the present day male and female students are accepted on the same footing at the university, the proportion of students being about thirty per cent female and seventy per cent male.

Mary Kingsley Tibbitts was the first woman to register at the local institution way back in 1886. After having taken a three years' course, she graduated with the degree of B.A. in 1889 and received an honorary degree of M.A. in 1914. She has since been located in Boston, and has been engaged in the teaching profession. Miss Tibbitts, who is a native of this city, is a cousin of Right Reverend Ralph Sherman, another native of Fredericton, who is the Anglican Bishop of Calgary, and also of the late Francis Sherman, a well known Canadian poet.

ROYAL COMMISSION WILL PAY A VISIT TO YORK CO. JAIL

Now Inspecting Prisons in the Maritime Provinces

The Daily Mail's Efforts

As Result This Paper's Campaign Conditions Improved Here

That the Royal Commission recently appointed by the Dominion Government to investigate conditions in connection with penitentiaries and prisons will make an examination of York county jail, is the opinion expressed to The Daily Mail today by Sheriff C. N. Goodspeed.

The Royal Commission, which consists of Mr. Justice Joseph Archaibeault and R. W. Craig are now on a trip to the Maritime Provinces. Today they are visiting Dorchester Penitentiary and will later visit Halifax, Fredericton, Saint John and Charlottetown. After leaving here they will go to western Canada and following that they will make an inspection of a number of prisons and jails in the United States. They will sit in Quebec and Ontario.

Sheriff Goodspeed has received "no communication from the members of the Commission, and he believes that if they are to make the visit to the York county jail they will do so without any previous notice being given. From other sources it is understood that the Royal Commission will also hold a sitting here and make inquiries from certain former prison inmates as to the treatment they received while in prison. This inquiry will necessarily be held in private so as to secure the information without embarrassing any ex-prisoner who wishes to give it.

COLLISION AT DEVON RESULTS IN ARREST

William Foster, of Portland, Charged With Drunken Driving

Highway Bus Damaged

Affair Mystery to Local Police at Fredericton Station

A collision between a Highway Transport bus and a Maine car, took place this morning near the corner of St. Mary's and Union Streets in North Devon. The Maine car was proceeding down the road and according to those who saw the accident, was said to be "trying to take up both sides of the road at once." The Highway Transport bus, which was proceeding in the opposite direction, tried to get away from the Maine driver, even to the extent of putting the bus on the edge of the ditch, but was finally struck and met with considerable damage. At two o'clock this afternoon the bus was still parked on the side of the road at Devon.

The driver of the Maine car was arrested by Chief of Police Leo Hayes of Devon and brought to the Fredericton lockup. At the City police station the arrest of the man seemed to be shrouded in mystery as far as the policeman in charge of the local station was able to inform the reporter. That officer stated that if we wanted to know anything in regard to the man who was in the Fredericton police station, or to find out if there was a man there, that we would have to make inquiries from people over the river. Evidently the officer was of the opinion that some person or other over the river would know more about what was going on at the local police station than he would. (Continued on Page Five)

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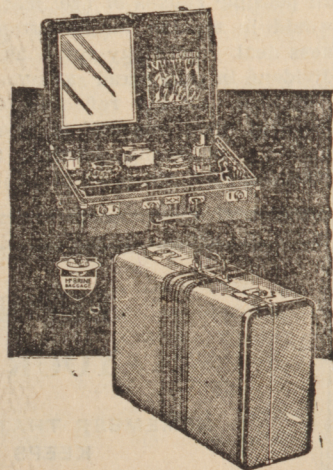
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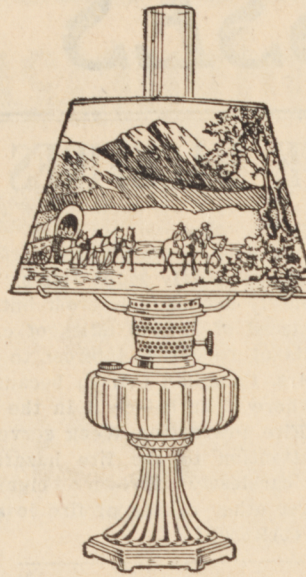
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
