## Songs By Popular Composers to Be Played by Dainty

TORONTO, Oct. 28—Melodies from the pens of the popular composers will be heard in a fifteen minute organ presentation, played by the popular artist, Ernest Dainty, from the Canadian Radio Commission studios at Toronto, on Wednesday, Oct. 28, at 7.00 p.m., EST. This is an eastern network feature. Mr. Dainty has written his own arrangements for this date of the following successful numbers: "Let's Sing Again," by McHugh; "My Romance," by Rodgers; "Beautiful Lady in Blue," by Coats, and "No Regrets," by Ingraham.

## Microphonics

Walter O'Keefe, m.c. of NBC's Saturday Evening Party, began his radio career in 1930 when he made his debut with Paul Whiteman's Rhythm Boys over Station KFI, Los Angeles. He started as an entertainer while a student at Notre Dame University, and became the dominant figure of the glee club.

Personal glimpses of some NBC personalities: Irma Glen, the organist, is slender and vivaciously attractive with blue-gray eyes and brown hair. Ramona, singing pianist, is tall, wears her dark hair parted in the middle and rolled in a knot. Vivian Della Chiesa is five feet five inches tall, weighs 140 pounds, has fair complexion and blonde hair.

Sidelights on Mark Warnow, who provides the music background for Helen Hayes' NBC vehicle, Bambi: Born in the Russian Ukraine, a child prodigy of music. . . . First a violinist, he conducted opera at 18 in New York City. . . . An arranger for years before organizing his own orchestra. . . . Called the Blue Velvet orchestra after his favorite color and cloth.

Early activities of some NBC personalities: A boy in knickerbockers, Budd Huleik, Colonel Stoopnagle's buddy, earned his first dollar passing out programmes for Arthur Pryor's band concerts. . . . Ten years ago Laddie Seaman, the "Biff" Bradley of Pepper Young's Family, was a boy soprano in radio. . . . Warden Lewis E. Lawes began his career as a penologist in 1905 as a guard at Clinton Prison, Dannemora, N. Y.

## NBC WILL FLASH RESULTS OF U.S. ELECTION TO WORLD

NEW YORK, Oct. 28—When the nation goes to the polls on Tuesday, November 3, the National Broadcasting Company will flash latest election returns to radio listeners throughout this country and foreign countries at frequent intervals from 6.30 a.m., EST, to network closing time at 1.00 a.m., the following morning.

Broadcast plans also include personal messages from the winning and losing candidates of the two major parties, to be delivered over NBC networks as soon as the Presidential race is decided.

Latest election returns from all 48 states will be furnished to NBC through the co-operation of the Press Radio Bureau of the Publishers National Radio Committee. In addition, NBC will make a number of on-the-spot news broadcasts, including crowd reactions and interviews.

The first election broadcast of the day is expected to come from the tiny village of New Ashford, Mass, shortly before 8.00 a.m., EST.

## First Results

New Ashford is traditionally the first town to complete its election count, and NBC microphones will be on the spot to record the results of the vote.

News of the vote count in the country at large will be sent over private wires to NBC studios in Radio City

by the Press Radio Bureau, which will make up its dispatches from bulletins furnished by the Associated Press, United Press, International News Service and Universal Service. Graham McNamee and John B. Kennedy, leading NBC announcers, will be in the studios to read the bulletins as they are received.

The first of the national returns will be read by Kennedy over combined NBC-Red and Blue Networks from 6.35 to 6.45 p.m., EST. The programme will include an interview with James W. Barrett, editor of the Press Radio Bureau, who will describe how the four big press associations gather the election results.

Then, throughout the evening until the networks close down, the vote tallies will be broadcast. At frequent intervals on the combined NBC-Red and Blue Networks, Kennedy and McNamee will read summaries, interpreting the election trends.

After the Presidential results have become certain, NBC microphones in the Roosevelt home at Hyde Park N. Y., and in Governor Landon's home in Topeka, Kan., will be turned on for personal messages from the two party leaders. Additional NBC microphones will be installed at Democrat and Republican headquarters in New York, and Chicago, respectively, for comments from Democratic Chairman James A. Farley and Republican Chairman John D. Hamilton.

## Where Winchell Gets Dope

NEW YORK, Oct. 28—"Where" listeners often ask, "does Walter Winchell get so much of the inside information he broadcasts on his Jergens programme over NBC each Sunday?"

Few people realize that Walter himself is a one-man press association. News is sent to him from anonymous reporters in all sections of the country. His correspondents range from newshoys to bank presidents, from taxi drivers to men high in public life, from Broadway habitués to the police.

The information Winchell gathers from these sources provides him with half the material and in his widely syndicated newspaper column. The other half he gets himself. Like any reporter, he carries with him at all times his pencil and pad of paper, ready to jot down a random thought or observation during his Broadway brawlings.

Because he wanted to get more intimate information of Hollywood and its famous stars, Winchell last summer spent several weeks in the film capital visiting with the stars, touring the studios, always on the alert for new data. Winchell makes it a practice never to print or broadcast any item that he has not checked himself. His radio script is rewritten three times before he goes on the air.

A forceful champion of the underdog, Winchell has fearlessly bestowed "orchids" and "scallions" as expressions of his opinions and has made his influence widely felt as a result.

On a broadcast not long ago, the Jergens Reporter announced that three-fourths of the jobs on American ships were held by aliens. A Congressman, listening in, asked Winchell for the facts. A law was soon passed, opening greater opportunities for American seamen.

President's Day, which is celebrated nationally with balls, parades, parties and local celebrations, is a Winchell idea. He made the suggestion in 1933 and newspaper editors enthusiastically endorsed it.
