Education Head Brings Back More Modern Ideas

FOUR DIVORCE DECREES ARE ISSUED HERE

N. B. Divorce Court Orders Two More Decrees -- Blood Tests in Evidence Yesterday--Previous Marriage Action.

Two more decrees of divorce were ordered issued by the New Brunswick Court of Divorce and Matrimonial Causes this morning, with Mr. Justice W. C. H. Grimmer presiding. Yesterday two decrees were issued making a total of four to date.

Decrees issued this morning were in Jean Armstrong vs Willard Armstrong, in which case Rev. Abram Perry, Percy J. Randall and Elmer Steeves were witnesses, and Wornick George Price vs Jessie Gertrude Price and Kenneth Irvine Erb. Fred W. Blakeney was a witness in the latter action.

In the case of Emma Agnes Goguen vs Mathias Joseph Goguen, the petitioner asked for annulment on grounds of previous marriage on the part of the respondent. The case was stood over for argument as to jurisdiction of the court to hear such a case.

A decree was issued yesterday afternoon in the case of Harry Crump, of Montreal vs Mildred Eva Crump, of Saint John. Witnesses called yesterday were the petitioner and Dr. R. A. H. Mackeen, of Saint John, provincial pathologist, who made blood tests. It was the first time in the history of the court that the evidence of blood tests was admitted. The blood were admitted to attempt to prove or disprove adultery.

In the other case yesterday John Wesley Lewis of Salisbury was granted a divorce from Margaret Verna Lewis.

WESTERN PROVINCES SYSTEM OF EDUCATION HAS IDEAS FOR N. B.

Dr. A. S. McFarlane, Chief Supt. of Education, Returns From Meeting of Canadian Educational Ass'n at Regina --- "Enterprise System" is a Fine One --- Fewer Exams. Larger School Units. --- Optional Subjects for High School.

Dr. A. S. McFarlane, chief superintendent of Education for New Brunswick, who returned yesterday from an extended visit to the western provinces, this morning told in glowing terms of the educational system of the western provinces, particularly Saskatchewan in which province, and at Regina he attended the four-day meeting of the Canadian Educational Association, which was attended by educational heads engaged in the administrative departments of all the provinces.

Especially did the Chief Superintendent of Education mention the tendency in the west towards fewer examinations, the trend of teachers marking their own papers, correspondence courses for those rural pupils unable to attend schools, the system of not having grades as in New Brunswick, and particularly the "system of enterprises," a method which tends to overcome the indiscriminate use of text books and overloading of subjects taken, and which by its comprehensive study of one subject, makes that subject more accessible to the student and also more interesting.

Speaking of the system in this province and comparing it with the western provinces Dr. McFarlane declared he was "strongly in favor of more optional subjects in high school and fewer compulsory subjects." He said he was strongly in favor of giving credit for music and art also. "This is one of the things advocated by the Home and School Association here at its meeting this week."

In the west, especially in British Columbia, the experiment of larger school units is being carried. In British Columbia, as one example, 63 schools, with an area of 164 square miles is all under one school board. This has meant a saving of \$12,000 to that province, and it has served to raise the standard of the schools.

PROV. CABINET IS MEETING IN CAPITAL TODAY

Matter of Appointment of Temporary Attorney General Considered -- Premier Denies Income Tax Legislation Report.

Premier A. A. Dysart had no announcements to make today at noon on the eve of a meeting of the provincial cabinet this afternoon, which will be continued this evening. It is understood no delegations are appearing today.

The matter of the appointment of a temporary successor to Hon. J. B. McNair, K.C., attorney-general, who is leaving tomorrow for England, is expected to be considered at today's meeting. It is expected that an order-in-council will be passed to have either Hon. C. T. Richard or the Premier himself assume the temporary position of attorney-general. Both are of the legal fraternity.

Premier Dysart denies reports that his cabinet is contemplating provincial income tax legislation. He returned recently from Ontario where he had been studying the financial system of that province but his visit has no connection with such a plan. He states that no one has been surveying the income tax laws of other provinces on his behalf either.
