The superintendent's report for the month of April showed the following statistics:—Patients in hospital at beginning of month, 40; patients admitted during month, 105; patients discharged during month, 100; patients at end of month, 45; medical cases admitted, 19; surgical cases admitted, 61; obstetrical cases, 13; births, 12; deaths, 7; major operations, 34; minor operations, 20; x-ray examinations, 83; x-ray treatments, 8; maximum number of patients in one day, 53; minimum number of patients in one day, 34. Daylight Saving It is understood that many of the members of the city council are in sympathy with the Daylight Saving scheme, while still others are opposed to it. As the Daylight Saving arrangement would not go into effect until after the closing of the city schools it is probable that no action will be taken by the council until the June meeting. It was indicated at the last meeting of the council that it was just possible that no action would be taken until the people had a chance to vote on the matter. Last year it was felt that Fredericton should adopt Daylight Saving Time so as to be in line with other places. The change in time was not adopted, however, until after the city schools were closed. This did away with the inconvenience of mothers arising an hour earlier in order to get their children ready for school. The Daylight Saving scheme lasted through the holidays and was dropped when the schools reopened. Many persons who were opposed to the Daylight Saving scheme at the start gradually fell in line and before the scheme was dropped again became very much in favor of it. Many of the business men and people employed in the establishments throughout the city found that they had a good long evening in which to relax from their daily toil or to work at their gardens and do other work about the house, which otherwise they would be prevented from doing. It is true they had to get up an hour earlier in the morning but in summer they appreciated the fact that this was the best part of the day. There are many who think that if a plebiscite was taken today the large majority would be in favor of Daylight Saving Time.
