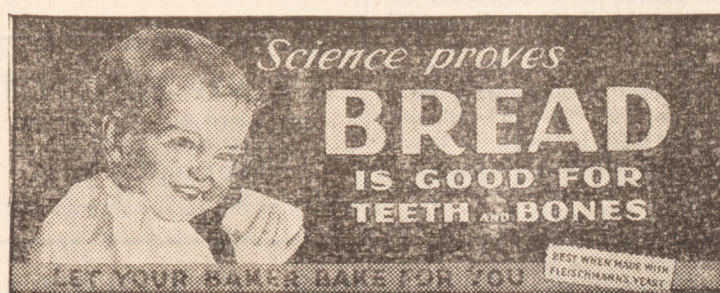
The following appreciative criticism of Miss Muriel Miller's book entitled Bliss Carman, a Portrait, appears in a recent edition of Acadia Athenaeum:

BLISS CARMAN A Portrait (Toronto: Ryerson Press), by Muriel Miller, is much more than the title indicates. It is, in fact, the biography of a poet's soul. Miss Miller, with rare critical acumen, traces Carman's

development (and decline) as an artist from "Low Tide on Grand Pre" to "May in the Selkies." She shows clearly the effect on his poetic career of the helps and the handicaps of his heredity and environment, the stimulus and personal contacts such as those with Parkin, Roberts, and Hovey, and the various sources of inspiration for his best poetry. Equipped with a discriminating sense of poetic values and a masterly comprehensive knowledge of Carman's poem and essays and of preceding studies of his works by Lee, Cappon, Shepard, Roberts, Hathaway, and Pierce, Miss Miller has produced one of the finest pieces of creative criticism in Canadian literature.
