LIMITS DUTY-FREE IMPORTS

WINDSOR, Ont., May 15-Although the new Canadian customs regulation permitting tourists to bring in from the United States goods up to the value of \$100, has been in effect lit tle more than a week, scores of Windsor residents as well as many from near-by inland towns already have taken advantage of it.
