CAR CAPACITY LIMITS DUTY-FREE IMPORTS

WINDSOR, Ont., May 15—Although the new Canadian customs regulation permitting tourists to bring in from the United States goods up to the value of \$100, has been in effect little more than a week, scores of Windsor residents as well as many from nearby inland towns already have taken advantage of it.

Radios for automobiles, tires, men's and children's clothing, dresses, cotton goods, boots and shoes, canned goods and bicycles are among the articles which Canadians are now able to bring at prices 25 to 50 per cent. lower than obtain on the Windsor side of the river.

Anything you can bring over in your automobile is admissible", Chief Clerk Harold Beardmore explained, "If, however, your purchases are so bulky as to require the use of a truck they do not come under the new regulations. A bedroom suite, for instance, which could be bought in Detroit for less than \$100 would be required to pay full duty because it could not be transported in the ordinary automobile."

Tobacco Limit Fixed

Specific requirements regarding liquor, tobacco and cigarettes provide that only one quart liquor, 200 cigarettes, fifty cigars and two pounds of manufactured tobacco may be admitted free of duty. This amount, it is explained, is considered as sufficient for the temporary requirements of the tourist.

To qualify as a tourist, the regulations stipulate that a Canadian crossing the river with his car, shall be sure to register with the Canadian customs officer his license number and the exact time he leaves Canada.

Each member of a family is entitled to claim the \$100 exemption but only for goods for his or her own use.

For Own Use Only

A woman may bring in a dress, for instance, provided it is for herself but she would not be permitted to bring one in for her sister", Chief Clerk Beardmore explained.

This exemption claim will be allowed once every four months, but all articles must be shown on the same affidavit at the one time.

Windsor retail merchants asked to comment on the new arrangement, which promises to cut deeply into their sales, were reluctant to comment for publication, preferring to wait until after the usual monthly sale check up.

The United States customs regulations are slightly more liberal than the Canadian schedule, but it is expected they will be equalized within the next few weeks.

SOUTHAMPTON, England, May 15—The Queen Mary, Britain's new super ship, put out to sea today for a 24-hour cruise along the south coast, probably its last trip before the maiden voyage to New York late this month.

SOCIAL CREDIT LEADER CREATES FURORE IN HOUSE

Reads Anonymous Charge of Intrigue to Control Canada From Wall Street — Cahan Says B. N. A. Act Change Would Not Authorize Provincial Excise Taxes.

OTTAWA, Ont., May 15 — John Blackmore, leader of the Social Creditors, threw the House of Commons into a furore yesterday by relaying anonymous charges that an intrigue exists to place Canada under the control of Wall Street.

The former school teacher from Lethbridge, refused to accept responsibility for the statement or disclose the author, finally withdrawing it after a stormy fifteen minutes. The incident was climaxed by Deputy Speaker Sanderson ordering the statement expunged from Hansard, an incident which hasn't happened in years.

ROBINSON GETS TERM OF LIFE IMPRISONMENT

Kidnapper Saves Neck By Guilty Plea

LOUISVILLE, Kentucky, May 15—Thomas H. Robinson, jr., whose impersonation of a woman failed to save him from G-men, pleaded guilty last night to kidnapping Mrs. Alice Speed Stoll for \$50,000 ransom and accepted life imprisonment without a fight rather than risk trial and probably hanging.

The 27-year-old "lone wolf" kidnapper thus followed the example of Harry Campbell and William Mahan gangster kidnappers, who, like Robinson, held the hazardous title Public Enemy No. 1, briefly before they were captured a few days ago. Alvin (Old Creepy) Karpis, the other of our sonsecutive major kidnappers caught since May 1, alone elected to continue in the courts his battle with society.

RECORD NUMBER TO BE GRADUATED AT ANTIGONISH

St. Francis Xavier University Exercises to Be Held Tuesday

ANTIGONISH, N. S., May 15—Commencement exercises at St. Francis Xavier University here will begin on Tuesday, and the graduating class will be the largest in the history of the university. Honorary degrees will be conferred on Dr. John A. MacDonald, of the Canadian National Institute for the Blind, Montreal, former student and Miss Grace L. Caughlin, Woodstock, N. B.

WHISKEY TAX NOT SOUGHT BY OTTAWA

OTTAWA, Ont., May 16—The Dominion Government is making no attempt to collect taxes on Canadian whiskey smuggled into the United States during the prohibition period in that country, it was learned recently at the Department of National Revenue. As a matter of fact the Dominion Government does not collect duty on goods exported.

Rum-runners on Lakes Erie and Ontario smuggled more than \$100,000,000 worth of alcoholic beverages into the United States between the time the anti-smuggling treaty between the two countries was signed in 1924 and the banning of liquor clearances for the United States by the Mackenzie King Government in 1930. Later, the smugglers cleared for St. Pierre and Miquelon.

United States Treasury officials obtained permission to secure records of this traffic at Ottawa and had been at work on the National Revenue Department books for some time when it was learned that the Canadian Parliament itself was denied this information.

The Dominion Government is still awaiting the decision of the Toronto court in which Basil ("Jack") Bannan of Windsor, new in the penitentiary, testified in an action brought by the Dominion Distillers' Products Company of Montreal for the return of duties on spirits alleged to have been exported to the United States. The Dominion Government is resisting any attempt on the part of such companies to secure refund of duties collected from them.

HALIFAX, May 16—An estate of \$39,842, made up almost entirely of life insurance, was left by Herman Russell Magill, Toronto, victim of the Moose River mine disaster. There was no will and a widow and two children are the beneficiaries.
