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DYNAMITING GIVES CITIZENS SOME WORRIES

Complaints Are Made to Mayor Charges May Damage Homes

Effect on Cathedral

Wrecking Work on C.N.R. Bridge is at Stage of Dynamiting

The Garson Wrecking Company seem to be giving the citizens of Fredericton a great deal to talk about and lots to worry over. A few days ago the worry seemed to be the difficulty which the company had in removing the wreckage of the C. N. R. bridge with the inadequate equipment which they brought here from Halifax. One day it appears as if the scow on which the crane is located would be pulled down into the bottom of the river alongside the wreckage. The next day many of the interested citizens are worrying as to whether the wrecked bridge would be removed from the channel of the river before the ice formed in the fall. The consequent delay in the building of the new bridge was a factor which caused these worries. Yesterday and today the worries were confined to the lower end of the city amongst several of the downtown residents whose ceilings and walls were alleged to be damaged as the result of dynamiting.

Several of these citizens rang up Mayor G. Willard Kitchen to find out what could be done in regard to the matter. The verger at the Christ Church Cathedral was also worried as to the effect on that building.

Mayor Kitchen received many complaints from citizens. He stated today that he had investigated the matter and had taken it up with W. U. Appleton, general superintendent of the Atlantic Division of the C.N.R. at Moncton. Divisional superintendent A. O. I. Crookshank stated today that no responsibility whatever is attached to the railroad in connection with any damage which might occur from dynamiting. The responsibility rests entirely with the wrecking company, who have the contract.

The company seems to be having troubles of its own, and these troubles seem to result from the fact that they started to move the heavy wrecked superstructure with entirely inadequate equipment. At the same time, while people may sympathize with the company in their troubles the public have to be protected against damage as the result of their operations, and also against unreasonable delay in removing the wreckage, especially from the channel of the river, where it is a menace to riverboats which have an absolute right to free navigation.

Rumor That Betty Lake Exploited is Indignantly Denied

Over four hundred people including many visitors from outside points have called at the home of Mr. and Mrs. Cuthbertson at Barker's Point during the last few weeks. Their visit was for the purpose of seeing Betty Lake, the sole survivor of the Pacific Junction tragedy of a few months ago. Betty, who is less than a year old, is thriving under the solicitous care of Mr. and Mrs. Cuthbertson and the healthful surroundings of Barker's Point. Betty received her visitors graciously by lying back on a big pillow and smiling. Several of the visitors who have called have brought donations to the baby girl. These donations have been received thankfully and put away by Mr. and Mrs. Cuthbertson for Betty. It is the intention of Mr. and Mrs. Cuthbertson to legally adopt Betty and have her assume the name of Cuthbertson, so that when she grows up all connection with the tragedy will have been as near as possible eliminated. The report which has gone about in certain quarters that Mr. and Mrs. Cuthbertson are charging an admission fee of twenty five cents to any person who wishes to see the baby was indignantly denied today by Mr. Cuthbertson. He states that they adopted the baby because they were its nearest relatives, Mrs. Cuthbertson being the sister of the late Philip Lake, and because they wish to bring the baby up in the best of surroundings as far as their means will allow. Any idea of commercializing the fact that they have the baby is repugnant to them.

W. T. CHESTNUT ESTATE PROBATED HERE TODAY

Letters of administration have been granted in the estate of the late W. T. Chestnut who passed away a few months ago while spending the winter in Florida. Harry G. Chestnut, of this city, a brother of the late Mr. Chestnut has been appointed administrator of the estate. According to the probate authorities the estate is valued a \$42,207 of which \$1,000 is life insurance. The late Mr. Chestnut had considerable real estate situated in this city. Since the death of the late Mr. Chestnut it is understood that there was considerable trouble in locating his will.
