Mrs. Martha Murch who has been ill with la grippe is able to be about again.



## TRIBUTES PAID TO O. L. BARBOUR AT HIS FUNERAL

Late Publisher Laid to Rest in Fernhill Beside Wife and Child

SAINT JOHN, N. B., May 19—Members of his chosen profession, former business associates, and other friends representatives of fraternal and service organizations, leading citizens of Moncton, provincial, municipal and civic officials paid last respects to O. L. Barbour at the funeral of the late publisher of The Moncton Transcript yesterday afternoon in Saint John. Two brothers and a nephew of

Mr. Barbour who left his native Waterside, Albert County to rise to a place of prominence in the newspaper business in Saint John and Moncton were the chief mourners.

The service was held in Brennan's Funeral Home at 3 o'clock, conducted by Rev. T. H. Stewart, rector of St. John's (Stone) Church and Rev. Dr. H. E. Thomas of the United Church of Canada. A choir sang several hymns under the direction of Eric Rollinson.

The pallbearers were chosen from among the late publisher's intimate friends in Moncton. They were A. H. Grainger, E. A. Cummings, F. R. Sumner, M. F. Tompkins, S. J. Macleod and J. L. Macdonald. Interment was made in the family lot at Fernhill Cemetery, where his wife and child are at rest.
