NEW LEVY PLAN SUGGESTED BY MAINE SCHOOLS

Would Make it Easier On Students Support Athletic Teams

Works in Houlton, Me.

Student Activity Ticket Means 10 Cents Per Week

Since this is the season for "levies" at the various educational institutions, with the athletic leaders canvassing for money from the students to carry on their football teams, the scheme employed in the Houlton, Maine, high school might be suggested as an improvement on the plan reported to be carried on at the local High School, in which the student is unceremoniously asked to donate a fixed sum for the support of his school team, and which often times is a severe financial strain.

Dr. A. S. McFarlane, chief superintendent of Education, told a reporter of The Daily Mail today of the plan as it is carried out in the Maine high school. Dr. McFarlane has just returned from Houlton where he addressed the assembled pupils and teachers there and where he also paid a visit to the Houlton High School. Roy Hayes, president of Ricker Institute addressed the Junior College also.

M. B. Lambert, principal of the Houlton high school, is the sponsor of the "levy" plan in that school. The idea is something like this: Each student is presented with what is known as a Student Activity Ticket on which is listed the various student sporting and social activities to be carried out during the several terms. If each student contributes ten cents per week—not an immediate strain on the student—he is entitled to take in all the athletic games and attend all the social functions without being subjected to any "hold-up" measures or forced to give a burdensome levy. The ticket is punched by the principal at each ten-cent payment.

Dr. McFarlane, who believes there is something in the idea is suggesting it to O. V. B. Miller, principal of the Fredericton High School. The chief superintendent of education visited Centreville en route home where he spoke to students and the school there. At Houlton he spoke to about 140 assembled teachers from various parts of the State of Maine, his topic being Education.

IN NICK OF TIME

MRS. M'KNIGHT LEFT ESTATE IN BATHURST

New Jersey Tragedy is Recalled in This Province

A Terrible Deed

As Miss Helen Rogers Taught in Business College in 1913

Mrs. Helen McKnight, of Bayonne, N.J., a native of this province, who was murdered in a sensational murder case in the State of New Jersey recently, and which involved her daughter and the daughter's "boy friend" left an estate in Bathurst, N. B.

According to today's issue of The Royal Gazette Charles L. Brown of that place, has been appointed Judge pro hac vice of the Probate Court of the County of Gloucester in the estate of the deceased, in place of N. A. Landry, Judge of Probate, who is unable to act on account of illness. The appointment was effective on September 19.

Mrs. McKnight was murdered on Friday, July 31, confessedly by her daughter, Gladys McKnight, aged 17, whose sweetheart, Donald Wightman, aged 18, had cried, "Hit her again!" Edgar McKnight, the husband of the dead woman who is an official of a cable company in New Jersey, stood by his daughter following the family tragedy. McKnight and his wife had moved to New Jersey from Bathurst many years ago. Mrs. McKnight's body was taken to Bathurst for private burial. The daughter, Gladys, had said she hacked her mother to death.

Before her marriage the victim was Miss Helen C. Rogers, and she taught in the Fredericton Business College in 1913 prior to the outbreak of the World War. She is remembered by some of the older residents here and she is included in a group photograph which is at the Business College today.

The angling season which closes officially today was marked on all New Brunswick waters by great success. The stories of successful ventures on the waters of the Miramichi, the St. John, Cains and other waters continue to come in.

Mr. and Mrs. Redington Fiske of New York, who have spent a week on the Miramichi with Charles Wade as guide, have returned to their home after a successful trip. During his stay Mr. Fiske landed a number of bright salmon, one of them weighing 19 pounds. Mrs. Fiske caught a 14-pounder.

H. P. Emory, Dr. Lieb, and Dr. D. S. Adams, all of Worcester, Mass., spent ten days on the Miramichi, guided by Charles Wade, and report extraordinarily good fishing. The party landed several fish, weighing all the way from 15 to 20 pounds. They also caught many of lesser weight. They were especially pleased with their trip to the province.

With the partridge season in the province opening tomorrow, a good many provincial sports are preparing to enter the woods for some bird hunting. A large number of non-resident parties have been booked for the partridge season, and for the moose season which opens on October 20.

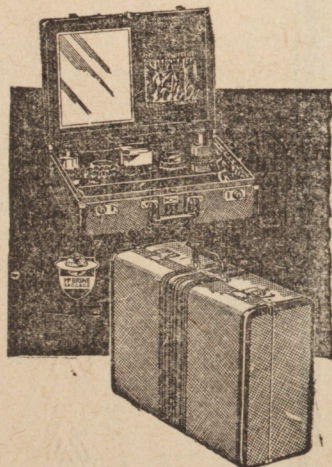

VISITORS FROM QUEBEC HERE RE TOURIST TRADE

J. E. Renaud and Claude Delisle Seeking Co-operation

Inspect Tourist Bureaus

Want Stronger Co-operation Between Quebec and Maritimes

J. E. Renaud, manager of the Quebec Tourist bureau and Claude Delisle, an official of the same bureau are in the city today for the purpose of meeting Hon. F. W. Pirie, minister of lands and mines, who is expected to arrive here this afternoon. While refusing to discuss their business until after a consultation with the minister of lands and mines, it is understood that they are making an inspection of the different tourist hotels and stopping places in the province. It is also understood that the chief object of their visit is for the purpose of arranging a stronger co-operation between the province of Quebec and the Maritime provinces in regard to tourist travel.

A large number of tourists from United States visit the Gaspe coast every year, whilst another large number come from Maine points into New Brunswick. If there is some way of arranging so that these two sources of travel could be brought together the scheme would be of mutual benefit to all concerned. The Saint John valley and other parts of this province possess some of the best scenery in Canada whilst the same thing applies to the Gaspe coast. Messrs. Renaud and Delisle will probably remain here over tomorrow and will then proceed along the Saint John valley towards Edmundston en route home. They have already visited points in Nova Scotia and Prince Edward Island.
