## SCREEN NEWS AND REVIEWS

Title Change For GB Release  
Arthur A. Loe, vice president of GB, stated this week that "Love in Exile" is the definite title of the film previously announced as "His Majesty's Pyjamas." The picture, a Capitol Film production, co-stars Helen Vinson and Clive Brook, and was directed by Al Werker. It is based on a novel by Gene Markey.

Eight GB Pictures In Production  
Eight new GB pictures are now in various stages of production. With the completion of these films, GB's 1936-37 programme will be more than sixty per cent completed.

The following are in the process of cutting and editing: "The Hidden Power," an Alfred Hitchcock production, starring Sylvia Sydney, a George Arliss starring picture, tentatively titled "The Nelson Touch;" "The Great Barrier," saga of the Canadian Pacific Railway, starring Richard Arlen; "Strangers on a Honeymoon," co-starring Constance Cummings and Hugh Sinclair; "Land Without Music" based on an Oscar Strauss operetta, with Richard Tauber, Diana Napier, and Jimmy Durante in the principal roles.

"King Solomon's Mines," based on the Rider Haggard adventure novel, is currently on location in East Africa, with Cedric Hardwicke, Roland Young, and Paul Robeson playing the leads.

Also on location is the Raoul Walsh production, as yet untitled, which features Wallace Ford and Anna Lee.

The screen adaptation of Kipling's "Soldiers Three" having just been finished, production is scheduled to start on completion of casting.
