### T. B. SURVEY

A tuberculosis survey is being carried on this week at Bathurst at the Sacred Heart College, it was announced here today by Dr. William Warwick, chief medical health officer. The survey at Bathurst is in charge of Dr. J. E. Paulin, the district medical health officer.

### ARE FREDERICTON BOYS

Visitors to the city this week were Norman McLeod, son of Mrs. H. F. McLeod, Charlotte street, who left last night to resume his duties there. Fred Maxwell, another former Fredericton boy, who has been employed with the Dominion Bureau of Statistics at Ottawa since 1931, also was in the city this week and left today for Ottawa. He is the son of Mr. and Mrs. J. Herbert Maxwell of this city.

### CONDITION UNCHANGED

The condition of William Hudlin, ripples, who was removed from his home to the Victoria Hospital on Sunday seriously ill, was reported to be unchanged at the hospital today. His recovery is doubtful. He is the brother of Nehemiah Hudlin, ripples mulatto, who is awaiting trial on charges of obstructing a police officer and shooting at two R.C.M.P. officers on Friday last.

For the past three years he had been employed as a scaler and bookkeeper with the Coburn Lumber Company at Ripples. He was very well known and deservedly popular and his death will be learned with general regret. Surviving are five brothers, Willie of Royal Road; Frederick of Saint John; Percy of Saint John; Vincent of Devon; and Elwood of Royal Road. Four sisters, Miss Elizabeth Nealis at home; Miss Evelyn Nealis of Boston; Mrs. Edward Case of Burton, and Mrs. William Currie of Royal Road. The funeral will take place on Wednesday morning with High Mass to be celebrated at St. Anthony's church, in Devon, by Rev. Father Donahoe. Interment will be made at the Hermitage in this city.

## ROYAL COMMISSION ON PRISONS IS IN F'TON TODAY

Hearing at Executive Council Chamber This Afternoon

Chairman Was Absent

York County Jail Conditions Were Discussed

Two members of the Royal Commission on penal institutions, R. W. Craig, K.C., Winnipeg, and A. J. Fraser, secretary of the Commission, are this afternoon holding an inquiry at the executive council chamber in this city. His Honor Mr. Justice Archambault, the chairman of the Commission, left Saint John yesterday and returned to Ottawa. The other members of the Commission are leaving here late this afternoon en route to Ottawa.

This morning the members of the Commission were in consultation with Hon. J. B. McNair, K.C., attorney general, and J. Bacon Dickson, deputy attorney general. This afternoon at two o'clock matters in connection with the York County jail were taken up. Amongst those heard were Rev. Dr. W. C. Kierstead of the University of New Brunswick, Prof. B. S. Kierstead of the same institution, Councilor John Doherty of Springhill, Rev. H. T. Buckland of the same place, and J. L. Neville, managing editor of The Daily Mail.

Conditions relating to the local jail were taken up and the jail menu, which has on several occasions been brought before the public by The Daily Mail, were gone into.

This morning the Royal Commission members met with Premier A. A. Dymally, Att.-Gen. J. B. McNair, and Deputy Attorney General J. Bacon Dickson and there was a general exchange of views between the Attorney General's department and the Royal Commission. The discussion was generally in regard to the establishment of prison reforms and the question of whether jails should be under the jurisdiction of federal, provincial or municipal authorities. Also discussed was the parole system and other matters in connection with prison reform.

Douglas Farmer, Thos. Dell Grasse, Dies Suddenly

Thomas Dell Grasse, aged 77 years, died suddenly this morning from a heart attack at his home in Douglas Parish. Dr. Charles MacKay, coroner, who was called to the home found that the death was due to heart failure. Although Mr. Grasse had complained lately that he did not feel well he was around this morning as usual and about eight o'clock went out to work in the barn. Nearly an hour later Mrs. Grasse happened to look out of the window and saw the body of her husband lying near the barn. Her two sons investigated and when they found that their father was dead they notified the physician. Deceased had been injured in an auto accident a few years ago, but his death today was not due to any effects from the accident, it is believed. Funeral arrangements have not yet been made. Deceased was a well known farmer.

## A HANDBOOK OF INFORMATION FOR N.B. POULTRYMEN

Distribution Announced by Hon. A. C. Taylor Today

Specially for Boys, Girls

Should Be Useful Guide to Poultrymen Generally

Distribution of a booklet of special interest to poultrymen is announced from the office of Hon. A. C. Taylor, Minister of Agriculture. While primarily a handbook for members of boys and girls' poultry clubs, this publication will be a useful guide to poultrymen generally. It has been prepared by F. Leslie Wood, Superintendent of the Poultry Division.

The reading matter in this handbook has been arranged in the form of fifteen lessons or chapters, each dealing with a specific phase of poultry work such as housing, incubating, brooding, feeding, a description of the common breeds, culling, judging, marketing eggs and poultry, maintenance of health and the keeping of cost accounts. The topics for study are listed at the beginning of each lesson and each is dealt with clearly and concisely. The booklet contains nearly one hundred pages and is a thorough text book for beginners on the subject of poultry husbandry.

The booklet is well printed on a good quality of paper. The value of the reading matter is increased by the generous use of illustrations, line drawings, tables and charts. The heavy paper cover will add to the serviceability of the publication and the four color effect of the front cover marks an interesting departure from the usual agricultural bulletin. ## Cold Breath of Winter Felt Here

Winter gave warning of its nearness last night and today to residents of the Capital. Snow flurries combined with a cold wind and rain last night, which witnessed the first sign of snow this year. The snow didn't last long but the cold weather did. The temperature this morning was 20 degrees Fahrenheit—12 degrees of frost. A cold northwest wind blew all night and citizens were forced to increase the home fires and the extra blankets to offset the biting cold. This morning heavier clothing was much in evidence.

Many local automobiles were "frozen" up by the onset of cold weather and cranks were much in evidence along Queen street last night and today. Ice formed on the streets, and one noticeable change was the coating of ice over the little cherub centering the fountain in front of the city hall.

### DIOCESAN SYNOD MEETING

The October sessions of the standing committees of the Fredericton Diocesan Synod of the Church of England, commenced its meeting here this afternoon at 2:30 o'clock, with a meeting of the Social service committee. The Board of missions will meet tomorrow morning and the executive will hold a meeting tomorrow afternoon. Thirty delegates are expected here today, which is likely to be increased to 60 tomorrow. On Thursday there will be a general conference of the clergy of the diocese, at which a feature will be addresses by Rev. Canon W. H. Davison rector of the Church of St. John the Evangelist at Montreal, Canon Davison will speak also at the service in the Cathedral on Thursday evening. His Grace Most Rev. J. A. Richardson, Archbishop of Fredericton, will officiate at the communion service on Thursday morning.

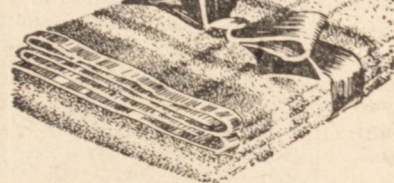
