## The Masters Watched Their Weight

Watch your weight if you want to be a successful composer, contends Harry Horlick.

"Screen stars and stage stars are not the only ones who have to watch their diets," continues the "Gypsy' maestro. "One fine example of how weight ruined the career of a composer is the case of Domenico Scarletti, the pioneer in the early Italian school. He was the master who introduced cross hand work in piano playing but when he grew too fat and was unable to reach across easily, he changed his style. His new method, introduced by force of nature, led to a bitter battle between him and Handel. Scarletti, like a drowning man reaching for a straw, contended that his simple playing was more sincere. A contest followed, with Handel being declared the winner. The two men never spoke to each other after that, and Scarletti's fame was at an end.'
