SIX INCH RISE IN WATER

The St. John river has risen six inches within the past forty eight hours, it was reported today at the city pumping station. The heavy rainfall of the past couple of days has caused the rise in the river level.

INJUNCTION DISSOLVED

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PROMINENT P.E.I. MAN MEETS OLD FRIENDS HERE

Col. D. A. MacKinnon, President Ch'town Fair, Here For Races

A Racing Enthusiast

War Vet, Reinsman, Fox Rancher, Sprinter, in Bright Career

Lieut.-Col. D. A. MacKinnon, D.S.O. of Charlottetown, P. E. I., who is attending the Fredericton Exhibition races this year, is well known in this city as a silver fox breeder, racing enthusiast, and fair executive. In 1915 he was stationed here training the 36th Battery Canadian Field Artillery. He stayed with the Battery and in England was made Officer Commanding. He remained with the outfit until the end of the war. Many of the men who served under him are renewing acquaintance with their old O. C.

In the realm of racing, Lieut.-Col. MacKinnon has entered this year two horses in the local meet. They are Heather Bell, 2.08 1-4, which holds the provincial trotting record of Prince Edward Island, made this year at the fair there. The other horse is Harvest Melody, 2.10 1-4 from Newfoundland, which won both trots at the Island Fair. The Colonel drives his entries and this, he says, is the real sport of the race. In 1924 he entered The Yank in the ice races at Mt. Clemens, Michigan, and driving it himself, made a world's record for the mile. On the iced track there, the Yank beat the field in the time of 2:15 1-2.

Foxes, however, is Col. MacKinnon's big interest and the firm of McLure and MacKinnon Silver Fox Farms, Ltd., have about 2,500 adult and pup foxes at their ranch each year. The Hudson Bay Co., of London are largely interested in this firm.

It is through the Hudson Bay Co., that the Island firm are able to market a great number of pelts each year. Col. MacKinnon states that Norway is the biggest competitor and this country places about 100,000 pelts on the European market each year. However, most of these are from Prince Edward Island stock which shows that the quality of foxes is rated very highly.

Lieut.-Col. MacKinnon, besides his interest in horses and foxes, is the president of the Charlottetown Exhibition, Ltd.

LIBERATE PARASITES

R. E. Balch, Dominion entomologist here, is leaving today for Salmon river, where he will engage in parasitic investigation. Earlier this week Mr. Balch conducted similar investigation in the Canaan river locality where there is spruce sawfly infestation.

ATTENDANCE WELL UP AS EXHIBITION REACHES ITS PEAK IN INTEREST

Grandstand Filled Last Night For Open Air Attractions, Though Rain Threatened — Judging Being Rushed.

With Thursday reached at Fredericton's annual exhibition the attendance record is well up to last year's even with the threat of rain. Another large crowd swarmed through the gates last night, although the afternoon crowd was not large, the racing having been postponed.

Last night the exhibition directors reported that this year's show promised to be as successful as other years. The attendance is expected to be large tonight, and to reach its climax on Friday and Saturday.

The big Free-For-All, the high point in the Fredericton Exhibition three day race card, is scheduled for tomorrow afternoon. Hundreds of harness racing fans from all over the maritimes and from points in Maine and the New England states generally, are expected to be present for this event.

The usual crowd flocked through the main buildings last night, examining the excellent exhibits in the various departments. The agricultural department, which is one of this year's biggest treats, was well patronized, and citizens and visitors to the exhibition were greatly impressed by the quality and quantity of these exhibits.

Midway Cleaner, Brighter

Ben Williams' midway this year is cleaner, brighter and more imposing than ever before. The banner line which runs the entire right hand side of the fair grounds while colorful has not the clashing gaudiness that it usually had. There is the world wide museum with its galaxy of freaks and funny people. The old time side show barker is there and the whole presents a real showy appearance. The monkey race track is attracting a lot of attention this year. Before the race the little drivers wait patiently on the outside platform and amuse old and young by their antics at the wheel of the tiny automobiles. On the inside the race is spectacular and the tiny drivers guide their machines at a "break neck" speed.

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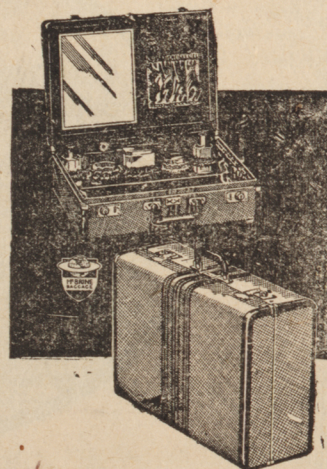

AFTER "SOME OLD STREAMLINERS" SAYS U.S SPORT

Chas. A. Campbell of N. Y. Bobs Into Limelight With Record Fish

Got 24-lb. Bull Salmon

Man, Fish Battled Into Darkness at Hartt's Island Pool

Charles A. Campbell of Wall St., New York and New Brunswick, New Jersey, war veteran and stock broker, bobbed into the limelight yesterday as a contender for the silver trophy awarded annually by the New Brunswick Guides' Association to the non-resident angler catching the largest salmon on the unleased waters of the province with the assistance of a registered guide. While casting from a canoe at the Hartt's Island pool at six o'clock last evening with Raymond Currie of this city as guide Mr. Campbell hooked a twenty-four pound hook-bill or bull salmon and brought it to the gaff after a strenuous battle which lasted over two hours. Darkness settled upon the earth while the battle raged, but a fishery guardian from a position on the western shore of the river procured a flashlight and paddled over to the island, where the big fish was making a game struggle for freedom, and assisted the angler in landing it. During the day, Mr. Campbell also landed two grilse, so that he feels that he did a fair days work and reflected some glory on the good old New Jersey city which is proud to bear the name of this fine old province. Three years ago he won the Guides' trophy for the largest salmon, having taken a twenty-one pounder at the Hartt's pool. Mr. Campbell has been an annual visitor (Continued on Page Five)
