Vines To Be NBC Tennis Reporter

NEW YORK, Aug. 24—With Ellsworth Vines, Jr., former U.S. singles tennis champion; John Tunis, noted tennis authority; the Jack Fraser and Nelson Case, NBC announcers, alternating at the microphone, the National Broadcasting Company will cover the Men and Women's National single and double tennis championships, beginning August 24.

The doubles championships will be played August 24 to 29 at the Longwood Cricket Club, Chestnut Hill, Massachusetts. The broadcasts, including summaries and expert comment, will be heard at 6.15 p.m., AST, daily up to the date of the finals, over the NBC-Blue network. The time for the comment and play-by-play description on August 29 will be announced later.

The Men and Women's singles championships will be played September 3 to 12, at the West Side Tennis Club, Forest Hills, Long Island. Summaries and comment on the play in the Forest Hills games will be sent out daily over the NBC-Blue Network. The broadcast summarizing the first day's play will be made at 7.45 p.m., Thursday, September 3. Succeeding broadcasts will be heard at 7.00 p.m., September 4; 7.30 p.m., September 5; 7.15 p.m., September 6; 8.00 p.m., September 7, and 7.45, September 8. (All times AST.)

RADIO COMMISSION PROGRAM FROM SAINT JOHN WILL HONOR WRITER OF POPULAR SONGS

SAINT JOHN, Aug. 24—A planned overnight stop which lengthened into a week's visit on the part of Billy (Hill-Billy) Hill, versatile New York tunesmith, will be echoed across the Dominion tonight from 9.00 to 9.30, o'clock AST, in the weekly offering of Bruce Holder "Fan Fare" programme. On that night, the orchestra, ensemble and vocalists will present their efforts in the form of a "Billy Hill Night."

A wide variety of the composer poet's works will be offered in solo roles. Nita McKiel will sing "Lights Out," John Riordan will offer "Wagon Wheels," Ena Barbario will give her interpretation of "The Old Spinning Wheel" while Holder, as a violin solo, will play "Sweet Misery of Love." Mr. Riordan and Miss

McKiel will face the microphone together to present "The Glory of Love," as a duet.

Among the thousands of radio listeners who will be tuned in for the broadcast will be Hill himself, back at his Tuckahoe, N. Y., farm, and with him will be deB. Holly, regular master-of-ceremonies for the "Fan Fare" transmission, a guest of the world-travelling writer.

Hill first embarked on the uncertain career offered in the mythical "alley" in 1919. Greeted as a fly-by-night contestant for honors, he soon forged his way into the money making end of the row and has remained there ever since. Ziegfeld Follies, Scandals, Vanities, movies and radio have been in line for his material and furnish a ready market.

"Timber," a ballad of the mining camps, designed primarily for the interest it would arouse in Canada, is featured in the current edition of the Follies while "Empty Saddles" is now being heard by theatre-goers as Bing Crosby moons over its plaintive notes in "Rhythm on the Range."

Among numbers Maestro Holder will have to choose from for his orchestra selections for this special programme are: "Sun changes," "Beautiful Lady in Blue," "They Cut Down the Old Pine Tree," "The Last Roundup," "A Shack by the Side of the Tracks," "Springtime in the Rockies," and "My Idea of Heaven."

He expressed resentment at the remarks of Olympic committee chairman, P. J. Mulqueen, who suggested Pease had gone to Berlin for "a joyride."

"Yeh?" he countered. "That's what he says. Well, they didn't do much to help me lose any weight. They wanted me to lose weight through their method—running around a track."

"Who could lose 17 pounds by running in two weeks? You might be able to lose it alright, but you wouldn't be ready for anything more than a bed when you got through."

Lauds Duplex
"The only fellow who gave any help was Dick Duplex of Montreal who paid his way over there. He knows something about boxing and was a real help. But half that other gang never saw a boxing glove unless it was on someone else's hand."

"I could have lost that extra 17 pounds if they had let me do it my own way. I know how to lose weight as far as I'm concerned and if they had let me take steam baths and had given me someone to rub the weight off I would have been ready for my fight. When they did give me a 'rubber' he wouldn't listen to me and waited until I was dry before he would rub with a towel. Well, you can't take weight off like that—at least, not off me."

"I weighed in O.K. under 160 at the trials. I had to, to be able to enter. When I got to Germany I weighed 177. So I was kicked out. Well, I tried my best to keep in condition but it's surprising how fast you put on weight on a trip like that. "When I was in Germany I ate very light meals and on Saturday and Sunday before I was supposed to fight, I ate only breakfast. On Sunday I took two steam baths. I would have taken more but they weakened me."

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
