### FORMER FTON PASTOR SPEAKS

### First 36 Miles Started

Contractors Will Follow Survey Party, Build Bridges, Culverts

At Renous today Hon. W. S. Anderson, member of the Dysart cabinet and chairman of the New Brunswick Electric Power Company, turned the first sod of the new Plaster Rock-Renous highway. Those present besides Hon. Mr. Anderson were

The survey party will work ahead of the contractors and the latter will be responsible for the work and for the construction of culverts and bridges and the like.

## SPECIAL APPEAL ROBT. BANNISTER HERE TOMORROW

Berry Mills Rd. Youth Gets Second Hearing By Appeal Court

### Convicted Twice

Appellate Division of Supreme Court Will Review Evidence

The special appeal session of the New Brunswick Supreme Court, Appellate Division, to hear the second appeal of Daniel Robert Bannister, Berry Mills Road youth, against conviction for the murder of Philip Lake at Pacific Junction, will take place here tomorrow morning. H. Murray Lambert, counsel for Bannister, is expected here this evening or tomorrow morning to present the case for the defense. P. J. Hughes, K.C., of this city, will appear contra and will likely have associated with him, G. F. H. Bridges of Moncton.

This is Daniel Bannister's second appeal to the Supreme Court of New Brunswick. After conviction on the murder charge by the Westmorland County Court he successfully appealed to the Appeal Court, which granted him a new trial. On his second trial he was again convicted of Philip Lake's murder. Now H. Murray Lambert, of Moncton, defence counsel, has secured a second appeal to the Supreme Court, which will be heard tomorrow morning, commencing at 10.30 o'clock.

## OTTAWA PEOPLE ENCOURAGED AT ECONOMIC OUTLOOK

Hon. Mr. Rogers, Chairman Purvis Discuss Matters

### Luncheon at D-Coy Inn

W. G. Clark, M.P. Had Citizens Meet Cabinet Minister

Appreciation of the economic condition of the maritime provinces was expressed by Hon. Norman McL. Rogers, minister of labor, and Arthur B. Purvis, chairman of the National Employment Commission, at the noon luncheon tendered to these visitors as well as to members of the city council and of the Fredericton Board of Trade, who were present at D-Coy Inn on Saturday. Both these gentlemen while here made a superficial survey of conditions so far as the labor problem went in New Brunswick. They left for home on Saturday afternoon leaving here at 3.30 o'clock by aeroplane for Megantic en route to Montreal. When some distance out they were compelled to return owing to the heavy fog conditions which prevailed and Hon. Mr. Rogers and Mr. Purvis took the Montreal train later in the evening.

W. G. Clark, M.P. for York-Sunbury was the host at a very nice luncheon at D-Coy Inn. Mr. Clark presided, having Hon. Mr. Rogers on his right and Mr. Purvis on his left. 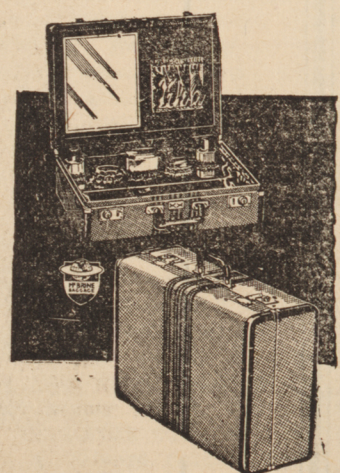

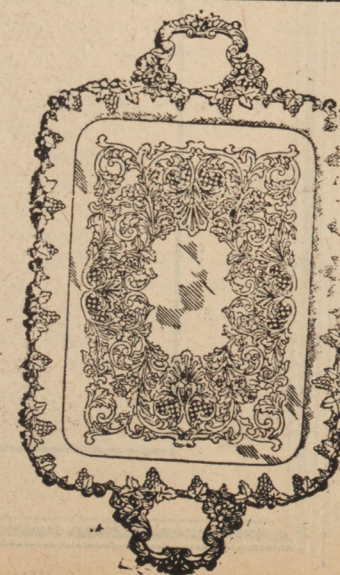
