**THE SYNOD SESSIONS**  
His Grace Most Rev. J. A. Richardson, Archbishop of Fredericton, is in Saint John today, presiding at the 66th annual Synod of the Anglican diocese of Fredericton, which opened its sessions today in the Trinity Church there. His Grace the Archbishop has presided at all the sessions of this Synod for almost thirty years. The charge of His Grace, which appears elsewhere in today's issue of The Daily Mail, was delivered after the service of Holy Communion this morning. More than seventy clergy were present.  
The Archbishop's charge which was delivered to the Synod this morning deals amongst other things with conditions relating to Christchurch Cathedral in this city.

HARRY CULLIGAN, POPULAR LOCAL RESIDENT, DIES

The community was saddened and shocked by the sudden death at his home here on Sunday evening of Harry A. B. Culligan, who has been an employee of the Canadian Pacific Express Company here for the past twenty-five years. Mr. Culligan who was forty years of age, had been ill for only a few days, and was taken only seriously ill the day before his death. Partially recovered from an attack of the flu Mr. Culligan had risen from his bed and been about his home but was suddenly taken ill on Sunday and passed away at six o'clock when pneumonia developed. Harry Culligan started as an express messenger on trains operating from Fredericton and in recent years was a clerk in the express office here. Deceased was very popular and widely known and his passing in his early maturity will be learned with general regret in this part of the province. He was a member of Wilmot United Church and was a member of the choir. Surviving is his wife, formerly Miss Greta M. Shaw; one son, Bertram and one daughter, Frances, both by a former marriage; his mother, Mrs. Harriet Culligan of this city; one sister, Mrs. Guy Matthews, of Devon, and an aunt Mrs. Albert Ashford, of this city.  
The funeral will take place on Wednesday with service at the home, 291 York Street, at 2:30 o'clock. Service will be conducted by Rev. J. W. Bartlett and interment will be made in the Wilmot section of the Rural cemetery.  
The late Harry Culligan was a grandson of the late Henry Braithwaite, the well-known guide.

ANNUAL MEETING OF CHRISTIAN TEMP. LEAGUE

Claim Most Auto Accidents Caused as Result of Booze

**Constitution Adopted**  
Large Number of Delegates Present From All Over the Province

The annual convention of the Christian Temperance League of N. B., opened in Wilmot United church vestry this morning at ten. Rev. H. E. Allaby in the chair. Devotional exercises were led by Rev. W. A. Burge of Devon. Rev. E. E. Fytche, of Sheffield, organist. A large number of delegates from different parts of the province were present. Minutes of meetings of December 3 and Feb. 19 last were read and approved.

Report of Agenda Committee was adopted, after adding the name of Mrs. Vernon Miller of Halifax as the chief speaker at tonight's public meeting in Wilmot church. The following committees were appointed: Resolutions—Rev. P. A. Fitzpatrick, St. Stephen; Rev. Dr. H. E. Thomas, Saint John; J. A. VanWart, Hampstead; Rev. G. W. Guion, Fredericton; Rev. H. S. Bishop.

Finance and Audit—R. B. Wallace, Fredericton; W. J. McAlary, Saint John.

The President in his address spoke very strongly on the growing evils arising out of the authorized use of liquors. He claimed that the government request that all the clergy of the province observed the week of May 31—June 6 as "Safety Education Week" neglected to make any reference to the accidents and deaths caused by drinking. But everyone who drinks is a potential menace to everybody on the road. The recent fatal accident near Woodstock was due to drinking. A very similar accident happened very recently in the same section. The Christian people needed to wake up and not pray but work with all their might. We must renew our vision re God's great plan for our continual improvement. We might expect opposition to become more intense, but such struggle if persistently fought would usher in success.

YOUNG LIBERALS CONVENTION AT DOM. CAPITAL

20th Century Liberal Association to Discuss Dom. Problems

**Number Go From Here**  
Unemployment, Youth to Be one Of Matters Discussed

Members of the Twentieth Century Liberal Association here are leaving tomorrow for Ottawa where they will attend the two-day convention of the Twentieth Century Liberal Association of all Canada, which opens on Thursday, May 28. Those going will include Frank B. Osborne, Douglas B. Tims, Dr. Percy Thompson, H. B. Sutherland, of this city; Walter Wade of Penniac; Robert Burns of Gagetown; Donald Duffie, of this city, and Ray Hall of Woodstock. Most of those going intend to make the trip by automobile, going via the United States. Others are expected to leave later in the week via the excursion route.

The convention is to be featured by addresses and discussion on the subjects of Unemployment and Youth, Canada's Place in International Affairs; Electoral Reform, and the Problem of Distribution. The discussion on the first subject will be led by Hon. Norman McLeod Rogers, Minister of Labor.

A banquet which is to be held on Thursday will have as speakers Hon. W. L. Mackenzie King, prime minister.

On Friday there will be addresses by Hon. Ernest Lapointe, minister of justice, and who is honorary president of the Association. Hon. Senator Cairine Wilson is also to be a speaker. There will be a reception at the latter's home, "Manor House," at Rockcliffe during the two-day convention.

Those attending the convention from this city will likely return on Monday of next week. They will stay at the Chateau Laurier at Ottawa.

The funeral will take place on Wednesday afternoon with service at the home at four o'clock. Rev. J. W. Bartlett will conduct the service and interment will be made in the Rural cemetery.

The late husband of the deceased, Charles H. Thomas, was a prominent business man and for a number of years was proprietor of the men's clothing store, Oak Hall. He was also mayor of the city of Fredericton in the year 1910 and was a popular and energetic citizen.

The late Mrs. Thomas was a member of Wilmot United Church, and at one time had been active in the Women's Missionary Society of that church.
