MIXERS NEEDED TO START THE PARTY

"Mixing them up"—"pairing them up"—in other words getting youngsters of the "teen" age "partnered" at a party seems to be the worry of mothers and young hostesses, too, who want their parties to be gay and "sociable"—not the stiff, dull and unhappy affairs that so often occur. At this age, girls and boys are apt to be a little shy about mingling and a little retiring, especially when there are one or two grown-ups present. But, get them started, and they'll be all right. These suggestions for choosing partners for various games and dances, will be helpful, we hope.

Reaching for Partners

Blindfold all guests, then have some one play a dance tune while guests dance with whomsoever they first reach out and touch, whether a boy or girl. Every few minutes call out "change partners," and explain that the guests must grope about for other partners, taking the first one that fate decrees they touch first. Continue this blindfold dancing as long as they enjoy it, then announce in the middle of a dance that guests are to take off their blindfolds and their dancing partners will be their partner for the game that is to follow. (This is especially good where there are more boys than girls or vice versa).

A good way to manage introductions or to get the crowd to mingle is to make a game of it. Give each person a numbered tag to wear. On the back of each of these tags are written commands such as, "Introduce yourself to

No. 16," "See that No. 9 meets No. 24," "Discuss the weather with No. 25," "Meet No. 13 and ask him (her) to join No. 31 and discuss the subject of football." These cards must be prepared beforehand and arranged so that every one keeps moving about introducing and being introduced to each other.

Portraits of well-known feminine movie stars are cut from magazines and pasted on cardboard stars. These are strung on cords and distributed among the girls who wear them necklace fashion.

Cards bearing the names of these movie queens are given to the men who seek out their leading ladies for the next dance or game. Small paper bags are distributed to the men, who may blow them up and break them on the back of any man whose partner they wish to steal. This is an excellent cut-in stunt when the tag line is long.

Men are given the names of states and girls the capitals of those states as a means of pairing off for partners. You'll probably have to have a map or a geography book or a list of states and capitals handy to prove who's correct and who isn't.

Each man is given a paper bag which has been inflated and tied shut. He is to explode it and find inside the name of his partner.

Soup-letters (the kind used in 'alphabet' soup) corresponding to the last initials of the girls, are put in a dish of water and the men fish for them with a bent pin on the end of a string.

PROPERLY FITTED EYEGLASSES BOON TO FACIAL BEAUTY

(By Dr. James W. Barton)

An attractive young woman began to have trouble with her eyesight—threading a needle, reading, driving her car. An eye test showed that she needed glasses—all the time—but she used the glasses for reading purposes only in the privacy of her home. She would not wear them at other times because "glasses were a sign of advancing age—made one look old."

As a matter of fact wearing glasses when they are needed really prevents one looking old. "Prolonged eyestrain causes wrinkles to appear prematurely and gives the countenance a strained, anxious, tired, drawn look, which is very characteristic and is far more to be avoided from the viewpoint of appearance, than the slight disfigurement of glasses. Indeed, so far from being unbecoming, there are some types of face to which glasses just add the finishing touch."

Unfortunately, sometimes, glasses are not adjusted properly, do not fit nicely over the bridge of the nose—the frame part over the ears is too long or too short, or one glass is a little too high for the centre of vision in one eye and too low in the other. Dr. Walter B. Lancaster in his booklet "Wearing Glasses," issued by the American Medical Association, says: "In order to get the intended optical effect, the eyes when looking straight ahead, should look squarely through the optical centre of the lenses or slightly above the centres, especially if the patient is tall and looks down more than up. But if one eye looks through its lens below the centre as is the case when glasses are tipped one up and the other down, the result may be to cause eyestrain."

"So may trouble be caused when the lenses are farther apart or nearer together than the eyes are. As a rule the lenses should be as near the eyes as possible; the optical effect is better; the wearer is less likely to look around the glasses; he notices the rims less; as the glasses project less they are less likely to be knocked off accidentally; the appearance is better."

If you have recently been fitted with glasses by an oculist or an optometrist and find that the glasses are not as comfortable and you do not see as well as when you were just fitted, you should consult them at once because it is likely due to a little bend in the framework, or you may not be wearing them properly. A little adjustment may save your eyesight and also your peace of mind.

inary business establishments in Canada were employing 49,885 more people than at the same period in 1935. An analysis of the returns by industries made by the Dominion Bureau of Statistics shows continued expansion in manufacturing in September, the eighth consecutive increase since the beginning of 1936.
