Dr. Pierce's contribution of Canadiana includes the following:

The Rising Village, by Oliver Goldsmith. First book of verse published by native-born English-Canadian poet.

Epitre, by M. Bibaud. First book of verse published by native-born French Canadian poet.

Songs of the Great Dominion, Lord Tennyson's copy.

Seward, by Richard Hovey, friend of Bliss Carman and Sir Charles Roberts. Presentation copy to Dr. W. H. Ward.

Hamilton and other poems, by William A. Stephens. The first volume of poems published in Upper Canada.

Lawrie Todd, by John Gait. One of the founders of Upper Canada.

Maria Chappelaine, by Louis Hemond. De Luxe Edition. Superbly illustrated by Clarence Gagnon.

Songs of Adieu: To Maisie, December 18th, 1893. An Anthology of Love Lyrics presented to Miss May Whelpley by her fiancé, Francis Sherman. Inserted in which is an extract from "An Epistle of Karshish" in Sherman's handwriting.

A Sonnet, by George Frederick Cameron. Letter from Mrs. G. F. Cameron.

A Seasmark: A Threnody for Robert Louis Stevenson. By Bliss Carman. 1895. Letters from Carman to Copeland and Day proposing issue. Corrected galley proofs, I, II and III. Also unused titles. The finished book.

The Manuscript of the Table contents for selected Poems, by Sir Charles G. D. Roberts, to be published shortly.
