PULP INDUSTRY
LIKELY TO HAVE
INTENSIVE YEAR

Market Improved by Fact That Supply is Depleted

York-Sunbury Busy

50,000 Cords Already Being Cut, Peeled in Latter Counties

The provincial pulpwood industry this year will likely be the most intensive this year than for any several years past. The market is good at the present time. The fact that the pulp supply has been depleted during the past year or so has forced more cutting, with the resultant higher price.

Pulpwood cutting in most parts of the province is now at its peak activity. The heavy demand this year will mean considerably more cutting than in any recent year.

The demand for the finished product in United States markets is at the present time very good and the U. K. market also is somewhat improved.

In York and Sunbury counties the activity has been increased along with other parts of the province.

Among those engaged in pulpwood activities in these counties are Grant & McDonald, who are expected to cut and peel 10,000 cords; A. J. Corey of Harvey, 6,000 cords; Marvin Phillips of Tracy, 5,000 cords; W. W. Boyce, 5,000 cords; Jack Brawn, of Millville, 5,000 cords.

Operators in Sunbury and York counties have large contracts to fill for United States concerns. Last year Saint John and St. George establishments contracted for 13,000 cords. The extra cut this year has proven a boon for farmers and operators and has also given employment to large numbers of woodsmen and others. Orphanage.

When delivery commences next fall and winter, hundreds of men and large amounts of money will be expended. The wood will be shipped by rail, highway and river routes at a cost estimated between \$75,000 and \$100,000.

It was estimated that between 3,000 and 4,000 cords of pulp wood would be cut in Saint John county and about 5,000 cords in Kings county. About 10,000 cords will be cut in Charlotte county for the St. George mill.

Other counties where operations are under way include Westmorland, Kings, Queens, Carleton and Northumberland.
