LEAVE SOON FOR OTTAWA

Premier A. A. Dysart, and Hon. F. W. Pirie, minister of lands and mines will leave here for Ottawa later this week and while in the Dominion Capital will discuss several matters of mutual importance to this province and the Dominion government. DOMINION HOUSING ACT

Applications for loans under the Dominion Housing Act, 1935, can now be received from the Central Trust Company of Canada, 610 Queen street acting for the Sun Life Assurance Company of Canada. Loans will be granted up to 80 per cent of the total cost of lot and building payable over a period of 20 years. The idea is to stimulate building and a person may own his own home at a monthly cost which would not figure any higher than rent. A party building a \$4,200 house on an \$800 lot of land, making a total of \$5,000 is eligible to a loan of \$4,000. The monthly payments on this would figure up to \$26.43 per month to be paid back.
