TAX COLLECTIONS

Earle Doohan at last night's May meeting. In addition it was shown that \$1,953.47 was collected during April under the four per cent Prepayment of Taxes plan on 1936 taxes.

Dean J. H. A. Holmes.

LEAVE SOON FOR OTTAWA

Premier A. A. Dysart, and Hon. F. W. Pirie, minister of lands and mines will leave here for Ottawa later this week and while in the Dominion Capital will discuss several matters of mutual importance to this province and the Dominion government. No announcement has been made as to what will be discussed but the provincial government leaders are expected to make a statement upon their return from Ottawa. No cabinet meeting is scheduled for this week.

DOMINION HOUSING ACT

Applications for loans under the Dominion Housing Act, 1935, can now be received from the Central Trust Company of Canada, 610 Queen street acting for the Sun Life Assurance Company of Canada. Loans will be granted up to 80 per cent of the total cost of lot and building payable over a period of 20 years. The idea is to stimulate building and a person may own his own home at a monthly cost which would not figure any higher than rent. A party building a \$4,200 house on an \$800 lot of land, making a total of \$5,000 is eligible to a loan of \$4,000. The monthly payments on this would figure up to \$26.43 per month to be paid back.

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PROVINCE TO STOP DIRECT RELIEF MAY 31

Gov't Feels Relief in Most Municipalities Not Needed Later

Give Ordinary Relief

Assistance by Purchase of Seed for Those in Need of Relief

In a letter from A. W. Barbour, deputy minister of Public Works, read before the city council last night by Ald. Fred S. Mundie, chairman of the Municipal Home committee, it was stated that the province's contribution toward direct relief in New Brunswick will cease on May 31. Mr. Barbour stated that the government felt that after May 31 relief in most municipalities would be unnecessary. If, however, it was necessary to give assistance it would have to be given as ordinary poor relief. The deputy minister's letter outlined the government's policy with respect to assistance in the purchase of seed for those who have been on relief or are in need of relief, announcement of which was made by Premier Dwyer several days ago.

Mr. Barbour's letter read that it is felt that where there is every indication of a large amount of pulpwood being cut and with the highway and bridge programme the government has in view, that relief after May 31 will in most municipalities be unnecessary.

In order to assist people who will be cut from the relief rolls, the government has arranged to assist in the purchase of seeds for them to make provision for the coming winter. These seeds will be distributed in three classes: To farmers, a maximum quantity not to exceed \$15 averaging not more than \$12, being potatoes, buckwheat, oats, timothy and garden seeds; to laborers who have small farms, not exceeding \$10 with an average of not more than \$8, being potatoes, buckwheat, garden seed and fertilizer; to relief gardens in villages, cities and towns, not exceeding \$3 with an average of not more than \$2.50, consisting of garden seed and potatoes.

COMPLETION OF RICHIBUCTO RD. STRONGLY URGED

Whole City Council to Appear Before Minister of Public Works

Six Miles to Complete

Ald. T. Earle Doohan Says Road is Very Badly Needed

Ald. T. Earle Doohan at last night's city council meeting emphasized the necessity of correcting flood conditions which yearly prevail in the Oromocto area and the Mauterville-Sheffield district, disorganizing motor traffic. He urged that something be done about it at once, and made a motion that the entire city council wait upon the minister of public works to urge completion at once of the remaining six miles of Richibucto road leading to Minto.

This would cost little and would prove a general saving of time and money to motorists. This road, said Ald. Doohan is "high and dry". Ald. Doohan said this was absolutely needed and would really be a saving. Ald. David McCaughy seconded the motion, which was promptly carried. Ald. Doohan said that in this connection Minto had asked for assistance.

The Daily Mail has urged action in this connection from time to time and has pointed to the danger and inconvenience which exists each spring by the onset of the freshets in this section of the province. Yesterday this paper pointed out that it had sent a representative last year to investigate the Old Richibucto road, feeling that if this road was built it would cut off several miles on the Minto route and would be a convenience in the spring with the arrival of the freshets.

MAJOR F. H. ROWE NEW DEPUTY LIQ. COMMISSIONER

Office Created Under Amendment to Liquor Control Board Act

Record of Service

Has Been in Service Since Establishment of Old Board

Announcement was made this morning from the New Brunswick Liquor Control Board that Major F. H. Rowe has been appointed as Deputy Liquor Commissioner, an office which was created under the amendment to the Liquor Control Board Act which was passed at the recent session of the Legislature.

Major Rowe has been in the service of the Liquor Control Board since the establishment of the old Board of Liquor Commissioners which was established under the chairmanship of Hon. J. F. Tweeddale, back in 1921. At that time the late Martin McGuire and A. F. Bentley were on the board. They were later replaced by the late Frank H. Murchie and Arthur E. O'Leary as commissioners. The board was changed to the present Liquor Control Board and Major Rowe's first position was secretary and accountant.

Following the war, after Major Rowe's return home from active service he had charge of the Information Service branch of the Soldiers' Civil Reestablishment for the province of New Brunswick. He organized that branch and was executive head from the beginning until the close of that department. He was transferred into this from the army by the authorities at Ottawa. Major Rowe has a number of friends who will be pleased to learn of his appointment.
