product will be thrown on the market more gradually, having a tendency toward stabilization.

The South American market has been a blessing to potato growers in this province, it was stated. It is the only large export market available to New Brunswick at the present, and from all indications will continue to be the largest outlet for stock grown here. The Argentine climate is not favourable to raising healthy seed stock because, although not being tropical, it is very warm, and it has been found that a rough and more severe climate such as is found in this province turns out more productive and stronger seed. Because of this, it is believed that although Argentine next year will begin an initial program of raising seed from the stock shipped from here this year, a very great percentage will still be imported.

CONVENTION OF CONSERVATIVES HERE TOMORROW

R. P. Hartley, K. C., Is Mentioned as Provincial Organizer
