ticulturist; additional members of the executive, Frank McAlpine, Lower Gagetown; W. B. Gilman, Springhill, retiring president; and Fred Smith, Long Reach.

W. B. Gilman, retiring president, was chairman during the two-day conference. The sessions were well attended and considerable progress was made regarding future activities of the association. Various phases of the fruit growing industry were discussed by different speakers and many helpful recommendations were made regarding the care of orchards. "Insect Control" was one of the major issues under discussion and the Association favored the adoption of legislative regulations in this regard. The members also asked for support of the provincial department in the protection of New Brunswick apple markets.

To Resume Exhibits

The Association plans to resume fruit exhibits at the Maritime Winter Fair at Amherst. Provisions will be made for classification of the various displays. Members expressed appreciation to the minister of agriculture for placing the Natural Products Act on the statutes.

The only paper delivered during the afternoon session was one dealing with control of brown heart in turnips. The paper was presented by J. L. Howatt, superintendent of the Dominion plant pathological laboratory in this city, who referred to the importance of the use of boron to
