The Council and Daylight Saving

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TRAINING PLAN IS WELCOMED IN THE DOMINION

Rehabilitation Plan is Taken Up By Several Provinces

OTTAWA, June 23—Although none of the Provinces has as yet signed agreements with the Dominion for the proposed joint youth training scheme, a number of them have indicated their intention of participating, according to a statement issued today by the National Employment Commission.

At the last session of Parliament a vote of \$1,000,000 was approved for this purpose. At that time Labor Minister Norman Rogers indicated this would perhaps be only preliminary to some more elaborate measure.

Letters to Provinces Letters were written by the Minister to all Provincial Premiers advising them of the \$1,000,000 appropriation.

MONTREAL, June 23—The glorification of the maple leaf, emblematic of French-Canadian patriotism, religion and language, will be the predominant theme of the annual celebration of the Feast of St. Jean Baptiste tomorrow June 24.

A brilliant and elaborate program of festivities has been prepared by the Societe Saint Jean Baptiste de Montreal, which will feature the annual procession of French-Canadian units. The allegorical floats will assemble at Park Lafontaine at 3 o'clock tomorrow and will lead the procession along Sherbrooke street as far as Atwater.

Maple leaves will be sold by officers of the Societe Saint Jean Baptiste and girls and boys designated by the society, to Montreal citizens on Saturday. The proceeds are to be used to help the society carry on their work in the interests of the French-Canadians.

Once again the traditional bonfire will be built and lighted at Park Lafontaine this evening. The bonfire will be blessed by Mgr. Olivier Maurault, P.S.S., rector of the University of Montreal while Mayor Adhemar Raynault will light it.

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ENGLAND GETS VICTORIA ON STAGE AND SCREEN

LONDON, June 23—England last night was promised a Queen Victoria of the stage and screen for the first time.

An official ban on theatrical versions of her life was lifted on the eve of the 100th anniversary today of her accession to the throne. One stage play and one motion picture based on her life were approved for presentation in England.

Less easy to please was the board of film censors. The French picture, "The Court Warfare" was sanctioned for display in England, only after a scene showing the Queen being kissed by Prince Albert had been cut out.

STRIKING WORKERS CONTINUE WORK OF DAMAGE AND DESTRUCTION

ESKIMOS SHOULD BE LEFT UNTAMED SAYS ANG. BISHOP

REGINA, Sask., June 23 — The white man should leave the Eskimo to his primitive, nomadic habits and not "civilize" him, according to the Anglican Bishop of the Arctic, Right Rev. A. L. Fleming, who passed through Saskatoon on his way south.

Treatment of Eskimos so far had been good, but the native were now able to get mail-order catalogues and order anything from silk underwear to spats, and that was not so good, the Arctic bishop declared.

Warships and Marines Arrive on Scene of Riot
