katchewan, has been cancelled.

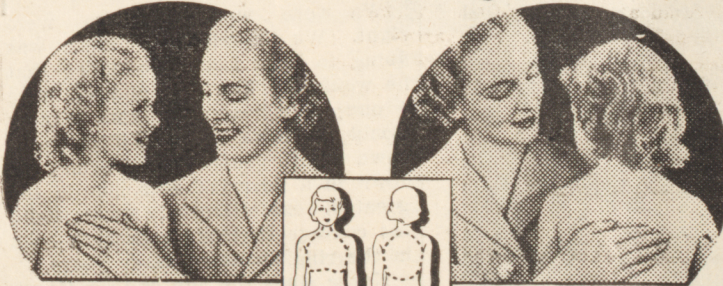

U. S. FISHERMEN ENJOY ANGLING ON MIRAMICHI

Baltimore Angler Trail- ed Half Mile by Salmon

Two non-resident angling parties
are now at the camps of W. T. Grif-
fin and Son on the Southwest Mira-
michi and are meeting with fair suc-
cess. One party of four is headed by
Harry Thompson of Baltimore and it
is the first to visit the river this sea-
son for bright salmon fishing. Dur-
ing their first day in camp they
hooked five salmon and landed two
of them and also a grilse. A twelve
pounder, hooked by Mr. Thompson
led him a race for half a mile down
the river, and the angler after the
fish had been netted remarked that
the thrill it gave him repaid him for
the trip. The second party at the
Griffin camps is composed of J. W.
Curtis and Mr. Fox of Hartland, Con-
necticut. They fished the Miramichi
last year with success, and are look-
ing forward to lots of sport on the
present occasion. Ernest L. Ipsen
of North Bradford, Mass., artist, who
has a summer home near Boiestown,
landed his first salmon of the season
this week.

Word comes from Hartland that a
number of Atlantic salmon have been
taken from the pool opposite that
town by fly fishermen, and that local
anglers were the lucky ones. The
river at Hartland is now free of run-
ning pulp and anglers are looking
forward to some good sport. Trout
fishing on the two branches of the
Southwest Miramichi River at Juniper,
40 miles west of Hartland, is now
reported to be at its best.
