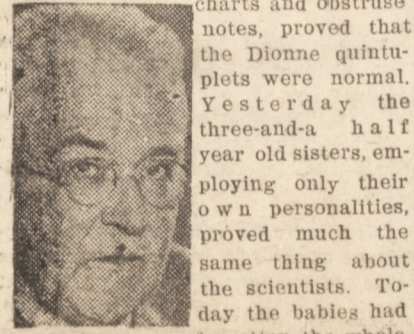
Savants Amazed At Quintuplets, Special Showing

Five Little Dionne Girls Are Being Brought Up Like Little Princesses

Children Show No Concern Over the Presence of Scientists

GALLANDER, Ont., Nov. 2—On Saturday a group of scientists, using charts and obtruse notes, proved that the Dionne quintuplets were normal. Yesterday the three-and-a-half year old sisters, employing only their own personalities, proved much the same thing about the scientists. Today the babies had forgotten the whole thing while the scientists still were exclaiming.

At a "special showing" of the sisters at play in their nursery here, the specialists disclosed by their reactions and comments that they were just ordinary human beings in the presence of youngsters despite the scientific training.

One bearded scholar who had talked at length about "reflexes" "perception" and like the day before summed up his conclusions yesterday with the remarks, "Gosh, they're great!"

Nursery Visits Treat Another who had found the conference in Toronto "an interesting study" described the nursery show as "a rare treat". Others who came to consider the babies as laboratory specimens went away calling them "wonderful children."

Some of the women specialists in the group which came here by special train even picked up and tucked away a few of the tiny stones called "maternity pebbles" which, according to local superstition, exert a magical influence on the stork.

Olivia Dionne, father of the quintuplets, was the only adult present who appeared unimpressed. Asked what he thought, he said: "Me? I have no time to think."

GAME MORE PLENTIFUL IN NORTHERN ONTARIO THAN FOR MANY YEARS

Reports From Hunting Districts Indicate Deer, Moose, Bear Will Provide Real Sport

TORONTO, Nov. 2—With the open season for the hunting of deer and moose and other big game in full swing in most northern sections of Ontario, the indications are that game is more plentiful and conditions generally better than for many years.

This is born out by reports coming in from all parts of the Northland the past week, from returning hunters, from agents and other employees of the Canadian National and Canadian Pacific Railways and other reliable sources.

The season for deer and moose opened in the northerly part of the Province, above the main line of the Canadian National Railways, or a line running west from Cochrane to Minaki, on the Manitoba border, on Sept. 15, and continues until Nov. 25.

Below that line, to a boundary designated by North Bay and the Mac-tawa River, Lake Nipissing and the (Continued on Page Five)

JAPAN ACCEPTS RESPONSIBILITY OF DEATH BRIT. MEN

(Special to The Daily Mail) LONDON, Nov. 2—Japan has accepted the responsibility of the three deaths of the Ulster rifles. At first the Nippon government denied the responsibility after an investigation they found their guns to be in error. Steps will be taken to deal with the persons responsible. Compensation will be paid to the families of the soldiers who lost their lives.

HIGHER TAXES SAID BURDEN

BOWMANVILLE, Nov. 2—For every \$100 worth of goods produced in Canada last year, slightly over \$22 was paid in taxes, the Bowmanville Rotary Club was informed today by R. C. Berkinshaw, General Manager of Goodyear Tire and Rubber Co.

Growing taxation is making it difficult for industry to prosper and expand, he said, and urged the greatest care by those in charge of governmental spending so that value is obtained for the public money expended. Mr. Berkinshaw thought there was need for correction in the present application of taxes and he claimed taxes on real estate were unduly oppressive.

This heavy burden on real estate had a markedly adverse effect on the construction and allied industries, and those employed in those industries, he declared.

British Fair Play

HAS THE TIME COME IN THIS COUNTRY when a man who wishes to work for his livelihood can be held up, jeered at, stoned, and spat upon, by those who stand idly by and do not wish to work? This is practically the situation which exists at Minto at the present time and which is apparently encouraged by people who do not wish to work themselves. The country is coming to a strange state of affairs when a guard of Mounted Police is necessary to protect men who want to proceed peacefully about their daily avocations. Is this our idea of liberty as we are supposed to enjoy it under the British flag? During the past week men who wished to work in the Rothwell mines were showered with stones and proceeded to work accompanied by jeers and yells from the mob. Others were in danger and some were chased into the woods. This may be the way things are carried on in some of the states of the Union but it is a poor parody on British justice when such things are allowed to go on in this country. If there is a law against insulting a man and stopping him when he is proceeding peacefully to his work, this law should be put into effect with the least possible delay. If there is no such law on the statute book, then the sooner that the powers that be get busy and have a law enacted that will protect citizens against mobs the better it will be for the country.

As we have before stated every man in this country is entitled to sell his labor as he would sell other commodities at the best price that he can command. If a man is not satisfied with his employment, his wages, or the condition of his work, he is at liberty to go elsewhere and it is his duty to himself that he should do so. If he wishes to walk out of a job and stand around idle it is probably nobody's business but his own, so long as he does not ask anybody else to keep him. But when it comes to the time when the men standing around idle can step out on the street and tell the other fellow that he should not go to work there is something wrong.

It is said by those who are in a position to know, that the working conditions at the Rothwell mine operated by W. Benton Evans, are perfectly satisfactory. It is also said that the wage conditions were satisfactory but that Mr. Evans refused to recognize the United Mine Workers' Union of America, and the members of the Union were bound that his establishment would not run unless he did. Surely the time has not come when this country when a man should be dictated to by a lot of outsiders as to how he is to run his business. If the outside agitators who are working in connection with the strikers at Minto are within the law the only thing that they can be blamed for is their unlimited gall. If they are not within the law the sooner that action is taken in regard to the matter the better it will be. (Continued on Page Four)

CARDINAL VILLENEUVE PRAISES ACTION OF MONTREAL MAYOR IN PLACING A BAN ON COMMUNIST MEETINGS

Quebec Mayor Asks Federal Authorities To Take Proper Steps

CRIMINAL OFFENSE, PUNISHABLE

Christian Civilization Rights to be Protected

QUEBEC, Nov. 2—Urging steps to guard young Canadians against invasion of Communism into their "social and spiritual lives," Cardinal J. M. Rodrigue Villeneuve told a Quebec youth rally last night that he approved "the resistance which has been made to proposed Communist meetings in Montreal."

"I congratulate the religious and municipal authorities who have opposed the Montreal meetings and the people who have denounced them—I invite you to do likewise," said the Cardinal, speaking before an estimated crowd of 10,000 at Quebec exhibition grounds.

Cardinal Villeneuve saw "pagan invasions" as seeking first for establishment in "social life, to pave the way for its living and hypocritical campaign into the disruption of our spiritual lives."

Freedom "Pagan" "Paganism has many offers," he continued. "Among them are freedom

of speech, freedom to insult our traditions, our beliefs and our religion.

"Does the liberty they also offer include the provision that foreigners be permitted to come to this country, bringing with them armaments, the spying and seduction that have wreaked havoc among the people of other nations?"

"Under the pretext of respecting law and order," Cardinal Villeneuve charged, "these invaders plan upset of our political, social and religious lives so that the individual will be crushed without mercy or consideration."

An Act To Reduce Interest Charges Alta Ultra Vires

Court Decides In Favor of Foresters in Second Action Rebuffing Aberhart

INTEREST CUT FIFTY PER CENT.

Scheme To Prevent Legal Recourse Invoked In Vain by Social Credit Government

\$1,500 WAITS JACK DEMPSEY Fee for Refereeing Montreal Match Held Since 1932

MONTREAL, Nov. 2—Just as soon as one can be found who knows what it's all about, Jack Dempsey, restaurateur and former Manassah Mauler, can collect \$1,500 from a bank account here—plus compound interest—since 1932.

It seems, according to civic authorities, the problem arises from a charity boxing match—refereed by Dempsey—which the city sponsored, approved and encouraged. In fact, the city did everything, except take financial responsibility.

DESCRIBES GUNS FACING GIBRALTAR

(Special to The Daily Mail) LONDON, Nov. 2—The war Minister speaking before the House of Commons this morning described the guns which are now facing Gibraltar. These guns range from a twelve inch Howitzer down to different makes and different ages of guns.

EDMONTON, Nov. 2—An act reducing by 50 per cent the interest on provincial guaranteed securities, and another requiring consent of the Lieutenant-Governor-in-Council to bring court action to collect the full amount of interest, were declared ultra vires of the Alberta Legislature in a judgment handed down yesterday by Mr. Justice A. F. Ewing.

Mr. Justice Ewing awarded the independent Order of Foresters a writ of execution to collect \$5,430 in interest charges from the Lethbridge Northern Irrigation District, whose bond interest had been reduced through the Alberta interest reducing legislation.

It was the second action in which the Foresters sued for uncollected interest rates. On the first occasion, in February, 1937, Mr. Justice W. C. Ives ruled the original reducing legislation ultra vires and awarded the Foresters \$5,400 in interest.

Ordered in 1936 The original interest reduction of 50 per cent was ordered by Order-in-Council in June, 1936, effective as (Continued on Page Five)

CONVIVIAL GHOST IS HOST AT \$23 A PLATE DINNER

"Coal Holers" In New York Toast Memory of Long-Dead Baseball Magnate

NEW YORK, Nov. 2—A dozen elderly gentlemen drew up their chairs tonight to a dinner costing \$275 as the guests of a convivial ghost, a man dead these twelve years.

It would have been the seventy-eighth birthday of their unseen host, Charles H. Ebbets, former President of the Brooklyn National League Baseball Club.

While he lived, Ebbets himself presided at the annual dinner, held in the "coal hole" of the Brooklyn Club, a basement dining-room near the coal bin. His guests tonight were the surviving members of the coal-holers, a group of his cronies once numbering twenty-three. One night seventeen years ago he suggested to them that dinners be made biennial.

CHINESE FULLY CONFIDENT CAN HOLD ENEMY

SHANGHAI, Nov. 2—A Chinese spokesman today declared China's army had driven Japanese forces back from the south bank of Soochow Creek despite a relentless Japanese artillery and aerial bombardment attempting encirclement of Shanghai.

The spokesman asserted the Japanese were repulsed in Shanghai's western suburbs by Chinese armed with only trench mortars, machine guns and rifles in the face of Japanese artillery.

"We are fully confident now of holding the enemy who is facing us in large numbers at Rubicon Road," said the spokesman.

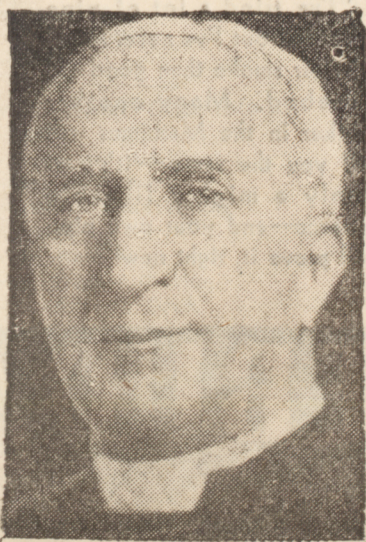
THE CHURCH NEEDS CO-OPERATION OF ALL ITS MEMBERS
