**NEW U. N. B. REGULATIONS**

A change in the regulations governing the marking of examination papers at the University of New Brunswick will be put into effect for the first time when the Christmas examination papers are marked. It was learned from the university office this morning. The courses at the university have been divided into two classes, term courses and year courses. Papers written on term courses are marked on a basis of 100 per cent., but papers written on year courses are marked on a basis of 80 per cent. for the first term and 120 per cent. for the second term. This new regulation has been laid down because of the fact that the second university term is considerably longer than the first, with consequently more work being covered in the Spring term.

Mr. Purvis is on a flying visit to the Maritimes, having arrived here this morning from Halifax in a R. C. A. F. plane piloted by Flying Officer Ralph F. Davenport, U.N.B. '34, of this city. The plane took off from the A. & B. Club shortly before 12 o'clock this morning for Saint John, where Mr. Purvis was a guest of A. Neil McLean, member of the commission, at a private luncheon at the Union Club. He spoke briefly over the radio from that city on the relief problems facing the Dominion.

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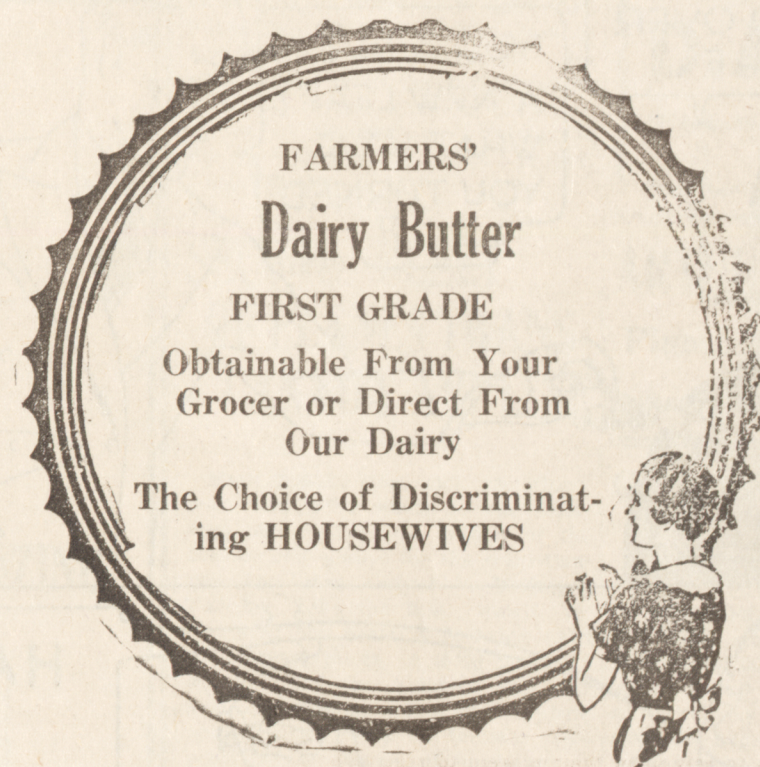
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
