No Inquest Into Death John Thornton Yes'day

No inquest will be held in connection with the death of John Thornton 38, Grooton, Mass., which occurred yesterday afternoon about two miles below Oromocto, it was stated by Coroner Alexander Barnett, Oromocto. It is expected that the remains will be shipped to the home of the deceased.

Thornton, who had been visiting relatives in this district, was a passenger on a Saint John bound bus yesterday. He shot himself with a 12 gauge shotgun while he and other passengers were out of the bus when it broke down. Marshall Foss, Waterville, Sunbury County, a passerby, was returning from a hunting trip. When he stopped at the bus Thornton asked to see the gun, at the same time purchasing two shells from the owner. The deceased stepped into the woods a short distance and shot himself. Notes were found in his pocket indicative of suicide.

He is survived by his parents, Mr. and Mrs. John Thornton and his wife, all of Miami, Fla., also two brothers, Thomas and Frederick, also of Florida. Also surviving are three sisters, Mrs. Morey Morrison, Watertown, Mass., Mrs. William Walsh, Miami, and Mrs. Hugh Gailley Marysville N. B.

One Owner Will Accede To Demands

John McDougal Stated Willing to Recognize U. M. W. of A.

This afternoon three representatives of the United Mine Workers of America, District Number 26, Minto, had an informal conference with Premier Dysart regarding strike conditions at that place. The representatives of the Union present were Messrs. W. S. Walker, Ware and Upham. Major W. C. Lawson, M.L.A., of Minto, who happened to be in town, stepped in to listen to the conference. Hon. J. B. McNair, Acting Minister of Labor, and H. R. Pettigrove, Fair Wage Officer for the Province, were also present. The meeting was held for the purpose of receiving first hand information in regard to the strike situation.

The conference was still in session at three o'clock this afternoon and no developments in the situation were announced by the Premier. The conference was merely an informal one for the purpose of discussing the situation, he stated.

Meanwhile the strike situation, which is allegedly costing the Minto district \$5,000 per day, remained unchanged since yesterday afternoon. When one operator, John McDougal, who employs over 70 men, acceded to the demands of the miners and has agreed to recognize the United Mine Workers of America.

This agreement was a result of a conference held yesterday afternoon between the operator and W. S. Walker, miners representative, who conferred with Hon. Mr. Dysart today.

JUDGING CONTESTS COMMENCE TODAY AT EXP. STATION

Results to be Announced Tonight; Hon. A. C. Taylor and J. K. King To Address Young Farmers

Thirty-one teams, each consisting of two members, assembled at the Dominion Experimental Station here this morning to compete in the annual provincial judging contests of the Federal and provincial Departments of Agriculture. Judging competitions are being conducted in four divisions, cattle, swine, poultry and grain.

Announcement of the winning teams in each division will be made at a meeting at the station this evening. It is expected that Hon. A. C. Taylor, Minister of Agriculture, and J. K. King, Deputy Minister, will address the gathering.

Winners to Toronto
The teams, which are chosen from elimination contests held in each agricultural district, compete here for further elimination, and the winners will enter a national contest at the Royal Winter Fair at Toronto.

Entered in the contest today are 11 cattle judging teams, five swine judging teams, nine poultry judging teams and six teams in the grain judging.

The dairy cattle project is being supervised by J. P. Flury, Dominion livestock branch, and J. E. MacIntyre and J. H. King of Moncton. D. F. Pien, Dominion livestock branch, and T. G. Herrington, director of the extension division, Dominion livestock branch, are supervising the swine judging. The poultry judging is being supervised by Leslie Woods, provincial poultry superintendent, and Antoine Goguen, poultry division, Dominion livestock branch. O. C. Hicks, superintendent of soils and crops, John Clark, Dominion seed branch, and J. B. Riordan, agricultural representative, Campbellton, are conducting the grain judging contest.

New Brunswick to Support Youth Employment Program

RESULT OF CONFERENCE BETWEEN A. B. PURVIS, CHAIRMAN NAT'L EMPLOYMENT COMMISSION, AND GOV'T. OFFICIALS

Must Get Away From Dole, States A. B. Purvis, In Outlining Lines Of Commission's Attack On Unemployment

As a result of a conference held here this morning between A. B. Purvis, Montreal, chairman of the National Employment Commission, and Hon. A. A. Dysart, K.C., Premier and Minister of Public Works and other officials of the provincial government, on the Youth Educational Employment projects now in practice and other matters relating to unemployment in this province, the Premier announced that New Brunswick will co-operate to the fullest extent with the commission in the furtherance of its work.

In discussing the Canadian unemployment situation with The Daily Mail, Mr. Purvis stated that, while this morning discussion centered around the co-operation of the government of New Brunswick with the commission in its attacks on unemployment relief problems, elsewhere in the Maritimes during his quick visit he has interviewed leading business men and municipal government bodies as to local conditions in regard to unemployment, in an effort to learn how the program of the National Employment Commission fits in with local conditions.

Four Lines of Attack
"We are following four main lines of attack on the unemployment situation," he stated. "First, we are trying to segregate the necessitous unemployed into various groups, according to whether their handicaps are economical, social, mental or physical." By so doing, he said, the commission will be able to differentiate between the remedies to be applied to different individuals, he explained.

"Secondly, we must get away from the idea of giving the dole throughout Canada, replacing it with programs of a constructive nature which will meet the kind of need felt by the unemployed."

Train Unemployed
"Thirdly, we must find a means of separating the employable unemployed from the unemployable unemployed, and of discovering what types of relief are needed by various individuals." After this is done, he said, it will be time to plan a program of projects to train men who are not trained in any calling at present, and to remove, as far as is possible, the handicaps, such as poor physical condition, which prevents the unemployed from rising from their unfortunate condition.

"Lastly," he said, "we plan to increase the employability of the unemployed, through a restoration of physique and skill so that consequently replacement in industry, both primary and secondary, will be to a much greater degree than heretofore."

Local Assistance
"To carry out this attack we must have a more adequate employment service, in order to tie the man to the job and vice versa. If we can get a more efficient employment service set up, we can place the unemployed in (Continued on Page Five)

Kenneth G. Campbell Draws Plans For Addition to Jordan San.

Plans submitted by Kenneth G. Campbell of this city for the new wing of the Jordan Memorial Sanatorium were approved at a meeting of the commissioners of the institution in Moncton, and it was decided to begin construction of the addition immediately. The design submitted by Mr. Campbell had been previously approved by the provincial government and was discussed fully at the meeting yesterday.

According to Mr. Campbell, the new structure will cost in the vicinity of \$45,000, and will accommodate beds for 52 additional patients. The building follows the general design of the sanatorium, being a brick structure with a large proportion of the walls glassed in for sleeping porches.

Crowded Conditions
It was stated at the meeting that the addition was absolutely necessary because of the crowded conditions of the institution.

Following the meeting, which was held in the office of Senator C. W. Robinson, the commissioners proceeded to River Glade where they inspected the institution.

Among those attending the meeting were J. A. Doucet, M.L.A., Paquetville; James A. Murray, Sussex; Dr. E. A. Smith, Shediac; Dr. P. M. Knox, superintendent of the sanatorium, and M. T. Blacklock, business manager.

Saint John Schools To Remain Closed

The public schools of Saint John City, those of the parishes of Lancaster and Simonds in Saint John County, and those schools at Rousesay, Hampton and Sussex will remain closed for another week, it was decided this morning as a result of a meeting held at Saint John between Hon. A. P. Paterson, Minister of Education, Federal and Municipal Relations, and officials of the Departments of Health and Education, it was announced this afternoon.

This action comes as a result of the continued prevalence of infantile paralysis in those districts, one new case having been reported at Saint John this morning, bringing the provincial total up to 147.

Meanwhile, school officials at the port city went ahead with a program of broadcasting school lessons over the radio in an effort to minimize the great loss of school time this fall due to the prevalence of the dread disease.
