#### Cigarette Ousting Pipe

The entrance of women into the heretofore practically exclusive male following of Lady Nicotine has greatly increased the consumption of cigarettes. Over in Great Britain, the world's great tobacco market, even the pipe has gone into decline, the younger generation as it reaches "smoking" age turning to the cigarette rather than the pipes of their fathers. The United States is the principal source of supply for this tobacco, supplying last year a total of 214,467,438 lbs. Empire countries supplied 52,816,527 lbs. with Southern Rhodesia topping the list, followed by Nyasaland, British India, Canada (9,463,687 lbs.) Canadian flue-cured tobacco has established a place for itself in the British market both for pipe use and for cigarettes, according to the Agricultural Department of the Canadian National Railways. The outlook for Empire tobaccos is very favourable and in the case of Canada, certainty of adequate supplies is a big factor in obtaining a larger share of the market.

#### **Maritime Business Better**

Business in the Maritimes is much better than last year according to the business summary issued by the Bank of Montreal. The report says:

Maritime Provinces-Wholesale and retail sales are running in excess vator. The latter fears the stares. of tast year. Collections are fair to good. Woods operations have been completed and the cut is reported to be much larger than last year. Lumber markets are strong. Pulpwood is in active demand at advancing prices. Paper mills continue operating at a high rate of production. Cotton factories and woollen mills are well employed. Prime fox pelts are bringing for those unable to attend the ceregood prices. Production of steel ingots continues at capacity. Building trades mony itself. in the larger centres reflect increased activity. Coal raised during March totalled 347,585 tons as compared with 337,694 tons in March, 1936. Prices fer farm products are satisfactory.

"In the lumber industry the sawmills are getting ready to deal with an unusually large winter's cut. The lumbermen of British Columbia were handicapped by climatic conditions, with the result that their log cut at the end of February was estimated at 333,000,000 feet as compared with 451,000,000 at the corresponding date of 1936, but this decline was more than offset by substantially heavier cuts in the Maritime Provinces, Quebec, Ontario, Manitoba and Saskatchewan. The value of the lumber output of New on the ground that it grew in the em-Brunswick is forecast at seven million dollars as compared with two millions ployer's time. in 1936, and the gains for the industry in Quebec and Manitoba are estimated, respectively at 20 per cent. and 25 per cent. The newsprint industry continues its upward march toward prosperity; quite a number of contracts have been signed for 1938 delivery on a \$50 a ton basis. The mining industry continues to register exceptional activity.

The increase in wheat prices has greatly revived the hopes of the Prairie Provinces, where tax collections are showing a gain over the same period a year ago and the western grain growers are preparing to plant an increased acreage. Stocks of wheat are being steadily depleted.
