MAN'S RIGHTS SACRED

Hon. Mr. McNair's official statement regarding the Minto strike is as follows:

"Two weeks or so ago the Government urged upon the officials of United Mine Workers of America that the Fair Wage Board investigate and deal with working conditions and wages throughout the entire Minto district.

"Certain matters stand out today with a clear cut distinctness. It is now clear that the officials of the union ordered the present strike designed to tie up an industry upon which depends the livelihood of thousands of our people without giving the men involved a proper chance to vote on the question of strike or no strike.

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CANADA TAKES 40,000 SQUARE FEET FOR EXHIBITS AT NEW YORK FAIR

OTTAWA, Nov. 3—Canada has completed arrangements for exhibition space at the 1939 World's Fair at New York City.

An area of 40,000 square feet has been contracted for, on which an exhibition building of about 20,000 feet floor space will be erected.

The site is conveniently located close to one of the main entrances. Nearby are the buildings of Soviet Union and Scandinavian countries.
