In the past customers' meters have been read during the last. half of the month. All bills have been rendered on or about the end of the month, dated the first of the following month. This practice resulted in a large volume of work to accomplish during the latter part of the month,

The new method, which will allocate our work more evenly, will involve continuous meter reading and billing throughout the month, thereby relieving periods of congestion. The territory will be divided in six sections. Each section will be alloted a different billing period. Each customer will be billed once a month, but instead of all bills being dated the first of the month, the following dates will apply to the respective sections.

5th, 10th, 15th, 20th, 25th and 30th.
