and again, speeches by ordinary members have passed the forty minutes limit and yet by unanimous consent of the Members these speakers have been permitted to carry on until they have completed their long speeches.

Whether anyone favours or is against Governmental Inquiries, or Royal Commissions there is no doubt that everyone will approve of one of these investigating bodies, and that is the Textile Inquiry.

The reason is simple. As a direct result of the operations of this Inquiry, there is a good chance that the Dominion Treasury may be enriched by some substantial sums of money in the near future, when the Government takes the necessary action to recover certain tax claims against large corporations, which in one case amounts to no less than \$463,000.

This Textile Inquiry uncovered certain facts, and amongst them was that there were certain corporations which have failed to pay the old business profit war tax, which was replaced four years ago by the corporation income tax, and now the Income Tax Department in Ottawa is a busy scene because the officials are digging up old records and exploring amongst old laws, and no person will be surprised if some big news will result from these activities.

Even that is not the whole story behind this important matter, since it is quite possible that the disclosures of the Textile Inquiry may encourage the Income Tax Department officials to investigate the chances of collecting many past due taxes in other industries or lines of business where this old business profit war tax has not lapsed.

In face of all the efforts to keep certain matters as secret as it is possible under the circumstances, it is quite often very difficult for the Government or high officials to cover up their plans and intentions, when these are viewed by the experienced Ottawa correspondent, who can draw pretty accurate conclusions from certain movements, or tactics of particular persons in the Capital.

When the Government established the trans-Canada air corporation to unite all means of transportation by air across the Dominion, and they handed over the controlling interests in this historic undertaking to the railways, they offered the reasonable explanation for this action by stating that it was prompted by the desire of the Government to avoid creating any additional competition to the already overburdened railways of Canada, and also that they were entitled to this right since they had worked on this project for many years. There were no serious objections to this point of view.

But this is not the only explanation for this action on the part of the Dominion Government, although the reason that will be offered here cannot be found in the ordinary press despatches from the Capital.

The action is based on the general defence policy of the Government in the event of a war involving the whole British Empire in the future, since air transportation is an important link in the chain of defences of the Empire, and the newly created Canadian airways system permits the Government at Ottawa to take over the whole organization within a very short time and to permit the Dominion to run it as a State enterprise.

And the matter did not start to indicate these tactics within recent months, but really dates back to the day when the government became a large shareholder of the Imperial Airways of the Motherland, and when it is borne in mind that this huge corporation has been working day and night for a couple of years in serious efforts to create a chain of airways around the British Empire, and that the newly created Canadian corporation will co-operate very closely with the organization in every way possible, it is obvious that the whole story behind the Government's plans for the trans-Canada airways was not disclosed in the official despatches and reports.

In the past customers' meters have been read during the last half of the month. All bills have been rendered on or about the end of the month, dated the first of the following month. This practice resulted in a large volume of work to accomplish during the latter part of the month.

The new method, which will allocate our work more evenly, will involve continuous meter reading and billing throughout the month, thereby relieving periods of congestion. The territory will be divided in six sections. Each section will be allotted a different billing period. Each customer will be billed once a month, but instead of all bills being dated the first of the month, the following dates will apply to the respective sections.

5th, 10th, 15th, 20th, 25th and 30th.

In some cases the first bill may be for a period of more or less than one month depending upon the comparison of the new reading date with the previous one. Ten days will be allowed after the respective billing date before the account is considered overdue.
