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NEW VOLUME WILL TELL OF PEOPLE IN N. B.

Publication Now Being Compiled to be Useful and Educational Reference

Following successes with publications in other provinces of the Dominion, The Biographical Society of Canada, New Brunswick Division, has a comprehensive volume entitled, "Prominent People of New Brunswick," now in the process of completion. This work is planned to include public, professional and business men and women of the province and when completed will be a useful and educational compendium. It is not designed as a work of compliment, but of facts and will, apart from its historical value, be an invaluable reference in all phases of provincial activity.

In addition to the biographies of men and women who are living, Dr. Alfred G. Bailey, assistant director of the Provincial Museum, has undertaken a sketch of the prominent people who, in one capacity or another, contributed to the growth of the province and who have passed away.

The volume, which will be bound in Coronation Blue with the words "Prominent People of New Brunswick" in gold letters across the face, will have only three portraits, one of the King and Queen, one of Lieutenant Governor MacLaren and one of former Lieutenant Governor McLean.

In order to make the work an up-to-date record of the province it is the intention of the society to have their interviewers visit each town and city in the province. The value of the volume as a complete reference is the chief aim.

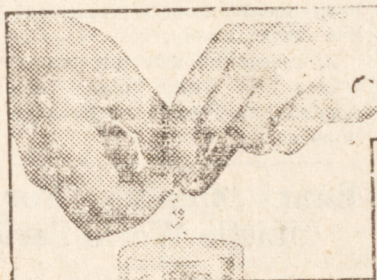

NEXT STEP WILL BE TO ASK ITALY TO WITHDRAW TROOPS

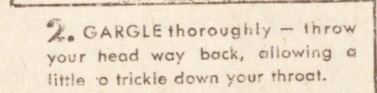
The next step in the part of Great Britain and France will be to ask Italy to withdraw her troops which are now fighting in Spain.
