BETTER LABOR LEGISLATION INTRODUCED BY ATTORNEY GENERAL McNAIR YESTERDAY

New Fair Wage Board To Be Established In New Brunswick

Bill Introduced Yesterday Afternoon by Hon. J. B. McNair, Attorney General

To Serve Without Remuneration

Two Labor, Two Employer Representatives and One Disinterested Man on Board


(By Mrs. J. L. Neville) A new rair wage Board to be composed of two Labour and two Em ployer representatives will be est lished in the near future under an act introduced into the Legislature yesterday afternoon by Hon. J. B. McNair, Attorney-General. In addition to the four representatives mentioned, one disinterested person will compose the fifth member of the Board and will act as Chairman.

The purpose of the Amendment of the Act introduced vesterday was to give labor a say in the fixing of wages. Under the act passed last year the authority to establish wage rates in individual industries where the Fair Wage officer was unable to make an adjustment was vested in the Board of Public Utilities. Under the Amendments introduced yesterday the Public Utilities Board will lose the power of determining the wage scale. The bill providing for the amendments for the Fair Wage Act includes the following provi-

shall be a board authorized to establish fair rates of wages, composed of five persons, two of whom shall be representatives of employers and two of whom shall be representatives of workers with one disinterested KING AND QUEEN person as chairman, who shall not belong to either class. Such board shall be appointed by the governorin-council and known as "the Fair Wage Board."

"The members of the Board shall hold office during pleasure and shall serve without remuneration, but the governor-in-council may fix a per meetings of the board and in transacting the business of the board and entitled to his reasonable and necessary travelling and living expenses as certified by the chairman.

Our Mental Deficients

HON. DR. ROBERTS, Minister of Health and Labor, struck upon several live topics in the course of his address in the Legislature yesterday afternoon. His remarks on the proper control and study of diphtheria, cancer, typhoid, etc. were well worthy of the consideration of the public.

One subject, however, which has been a live one in recent months in this city, and which was touched upon by Hon. Dr. Roberts, was that of the institutional care of mental deficients. Many of the Women's Institutes, I.O.D.E. Chapters and other organizations have brought this matter up in recent months. The Daily Mail has been extremely interested in the proposition. All the organizations mentioned have written to the Minister of Health asking that the Government provide suitable accommodation for these unfortunates of our population. Accommodation where they will be properly housed and surrounded continuously by a proper atmosphere. In such an atmosphere those of a higher class of mentality would in time be taught to care for themselves-perhaps in a large measure financially-and also be of benefit physically in working for whatever institution was looking after them.

Speaking of this matter in the House yesterday afternoon, Hon. Dr. Roberts said:

"Generally speaking, the authorities point out that centres of large population (urban centres) as a rule become responsible for the care of their own mental defectives, whereas in small towns, villages and rural areas the Province takes the lead and institutes mental clinics at which the provingially appointed psychiatrist can have certain regular appointments to supervise the work. But in both cases all authorities claim that the PIONEER WORK SHOULD BE CARRIED ON BY LAY ORGANIZATIONS WHICH NOT ONLY DO THE SPADE WORK BUT CARRY ON THE EDUCATIONAL PROGRAMME.

"New Brunswick is to be congratulated in having such an organization that has for some years been carrying on a most suitable programme. Dr. George Trueman, President of Mount Allison University, is the President of this organization. Dr. Mabel Hanington of Saint John is Secretary. Rev. Dr. LePalme, who is President of St. Joseph's University, Dr. Peacock, Director, Department of Education of New Brunswick, Dr. Kierstead and Councillor Grannan of Saint John City government are among those who are educationally interested in the work and who, I believe, ARE ANXIOUS THAT AN INSTITUTION BE ARRANGED FOR AT AS EARLY A DATE AS POSSIBLE.

"Upon enquiry I note that the capital cost would amount to between \$200,000 and \$250,000 and that the annual maintenance cost would be in the vicinity of \$30,000. It has been suggested by Dr. Hanington that this capital expenditure might be distributed over a period of three years. that is to say, they would build an institution in units, paying for one or two the first year and so on, so as the cost would not fall too heavily upon any one year. Dr. Hanington quotes Nova Scotia experience which suggests that their institution came about in 1927 and that year \$200,000 was appropriated for the purpose.

"I think I can speak for the Government in this regard, when I say that it is sympathetic in accomplishing something that will be practical and of service. At the present moment, however, the capital expenditure involved in the matter of bringing about an institution as outlined in Dr. Hanington's brief, to say nothing of the amount that it would take annually to support it, SEEMS TO BE IMPOSSIBLE, BUT I HAVE NO DOUBT WHATEVER THAT IN THE NOT TOO DISTANT FUTURE, IF THIS PROCEDURE SHOULD BE DECIDED UPON AS THE MOST EFFICIENT METHOD OF CARE, THIS GOVERNMENT WILL NOT BE FOUND

Hon. Dr. Roberts promised that his Department would, during the coming summer, make a thorough survey of what is being done in the principal centres of the United States and Canada. It is to be hoped that they can decide upon some measure that will prove to be in the very best interests of the public.

This is indicated by figures released in the annual report of the Canadian National Railways during 1936 the average number of employees on the payroll of the national system *** 78,863 an increase of 3,783 over the average number of employees during 1935. These figures include railway, express and telegraph employees. The total payroll of the national system last year was \$111,221,129 an increase of \$6,359,609 over the payroll for the previous year. percentage of increase in the number of employees was 5.04 while the

increase in payroll was 6.06 p. c. During last year labour received the largest share of the Canadian National dollar out of every dollar of operating revenue nearly 55 cents went to the workers of the system.
