VISITING TEAM DEFEATS U. N. B. IN DEBATE HERE

Mount St. Bernard Wins Unanimous Decision Last Night

Women debaters, representing Mt. St. Bernard's College, Antigonish, won a unanimous decision over the University of New Brunswick debating team in a regular intercollegiate debate held last evening in the Provincial Normal School auditorium.

The winning team supported the affirmative of the subject, "Resolved, that an increase in population is essential to Canada's future prosperity." There was a large audience present and the debate was acclaimed as one of the most interesting held there this season.

The visiting speakers were Miss Eileen O'Brien, Elmsdale, P. E. I.; Miss Mary Brophy, Lourdes, N. S.; and Miss Edith Butts, Sydney Mines.

Representing U.N.B. were Miss Louise Thompson, leader, Saint John; Miss Thelma Jewett, Fredericton, and Miss Annie Wright, Shepody.

The judges were Dr. Fletcher Peacock, I. B. Rouse and Mrs. A. L. Gerow.

The main argument advanced by the affirmative side was that an increase in population would encourage the development of Canada's undeveloped natural resources, thus resulting in increased prosperity. They also argued a large population would mean an increased amount of capital, and would also improve the educational and social system of Canada.

The team supporting the negative contended that increased population would not encourage prosperity, arguing prosperity should first be established. It was further contended that Canada needed more money than people at the present time. It was further pointed out that unrestricted immigration would result in a lower class of emigrants being encouraged to migrate to Canada. This, they contended, would have a detrimental effect on the standard of living enjoyed in this country.

Calling for peace, she said: "I should hate to think of my sons being trained to slaughter other mothers' sons with whom they had no quarrel." In Italy and Germany, the people were being trained to consider war as the career for men and to regard the duty of mothers as that of producing men. "Where women exercise the least influence, the danger of war is most acute," she said. Senator Wilson was addressing a charter day gathering, marking the club's 45th anniversary.

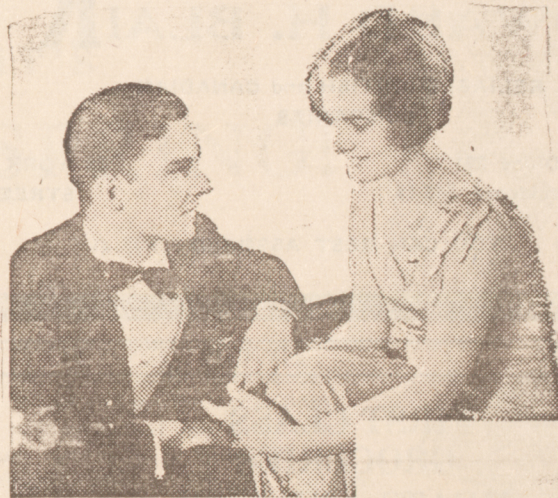
