A few of the high school students were unable to identify Franklin D. Roosevelt.

As to the Supreme Court and the central figures in the controversy with the President over judicial reform, many were in ignorance.

The tests showed the students placing the number of Supreme Court justices from five to 48. The chief justice of the body was named variously as Albert Einstein, Herman Goering, Stanley Baldwin, William Lewke, J. Edgar Hoover and William E. Borah.

### Goering Greatest Enigma

Goering provided the students with the greatest difficulty of any personality mentioned in the examination. Besides being identified as a Supreme Court justice, he was said to be Socialist Premier of France, Italy's foreign minister, the U. S. ambassador to France, dictator of Russia and winner of the Nobel peace prize.

Other "boners" included: "Romeo and Juliet" was written by Eugene O'Neill; Joseph Stalin is President of the American Federation of Labor; Alfred Landon recently was awarded a medal by President Roosevelt for outstanding achievement; Frances Perkins is dictator of Russia; Albert Einstein was named as secretary of state and head of the G-men; J. Edgar Hoover was listed as the Republican candidate for President in 1936; Helen Keller as Socialist premier of France; Joseph Stalin as head of the federal bureau of investigation; William Green as president of the Irish Free State, and Gen. Francisco as a Senator from Idaho.

Zero Grade for 198  
Out of the small army that took the test, 514 made grades of between 96 and 100. A total of 238 of this number were high school seniors. Grades of from zero to five were given 198 students and of this group 133 were seventh grade pupils.

The national average for high school seniors was 73 per cent. Averages for other grades were: 11th grade, 66; 10th grade, 57; ninth grade, 51; eighth grade, 43, and seventh grade, 34.

## WIDE PROGRESS NOTED IN CHINA, SAYS DR. BRACE

### Informative Address is Heard by "Y" Directors

Dr. A. J. Brace, 25 years secretary of the Y.M.C.A. in China, in the city of Chengtu, addressed the Board of Directors of the local "Y," and members of the "Y's" Men's Club and the Ladies' Auxiliary of the "Y."

Dr. Brace painted a picture of the awakening of China. He said that under the leadership of Premier Chiang Kai-shek, who is also general of the army, there was a strong movement under way for a uniform China. He said that never before in the history of China had her different provinces been so closely united as they are at the present time. The slogan and idea around which they are organizing their movement is, "Personality will save our country." Dr. Brace explained that by personality the Chinese people meant character.

Premier Chiang Kai-shek is working on a five point programme on the unification of the country, so that they may withstand any further inroads by Japan, and so that they may combat the Trotskyite Communism which has been boring from within. The first part of this programme is the building of roads. The Government has already completed 108,000 miles of road, much of which is McAdamized. The second part of the programme is radio. He said that powerful radio stations were dotted throughout the country, and large radio supply systems were installed as public services, so that even the poorest Coolies could listen to the news broadcasts. He said the radio was also aiding tremendously in the establishment of a common language. In third place, he stated, was the fact that the Chinese people are becoming air minded. They are building their own planes, and training their own pilots. The fourth point in their programme is educational. Every youngster is to have one year's training with all tuition and books paid by the government. It is compulsory that every child take this training.

Dr. Brace said that there was a great movement on foot for the removal of illiteracy among adults, and that the "Y" figures largely in this. The number of characters in common use has been reduced from 40,000 to 1,000, and it is the general thing for a person to learn to read and to write in four months of study. He said that the "Y" in his city, which is about the size of Toronto, advertised classes and that they had 12,000 applications, 10,000 of which passed their tests at the end of the training period.

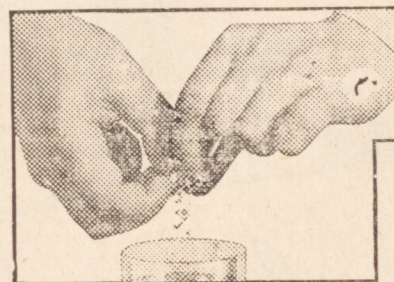

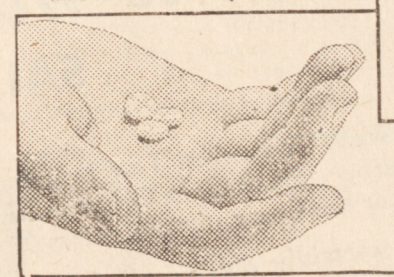
