The general belief of members of the tourist trade according to Mr. MacDonald is that a new program of advertising by the provincial government would remedy the matter to a great extent.

The Board of Trade Information Bureau at Wilmot Park states, however, that the number of tourist cars calling these have been about the same as last year. The discrepancy in figures from the two sources is apparently due to the fact that the bureau is becoming better established and that a much greater percentage of the cars passing through is registering at the bureau, even though the trade has dropped off, balancing the total.

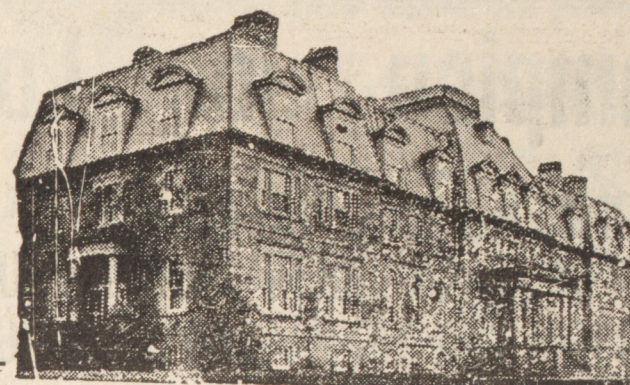

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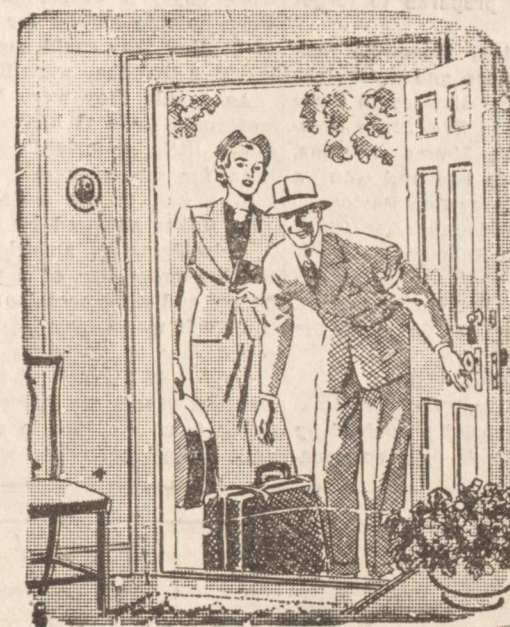
