

BEES PULL SURPRISE VICTORY ON NEW YORK GIANTS

GIANTS LEAD IN NATIONAL LEAGUE CUT TO 2 GAMES AS CUBS TRIM CARDINALS

MacFayden, Schumacher Mound Duel Outstanding Feature — Pittsburgh Noses Cincinnati—Red Sox Over Yanks—A's Take Washington 5 to 3—Indians Edge Tigers.

NEW YORK, Sept. 10—Hal Schumacher eased up for one inning today, and before he could recover the Bees shoved over the run that gave them a 2-1 decision over New York Giants in Boston in a 12-inning thriller between Schumacher and Danny MacFayden.

The defeat, coupled with the Cubs' victory over St. Louis, cut the Giants National League lead to two games. On the records, Schumacher actually outpitched Deacon Danny, giving up only six hits to the 12 the Giants collected. But he allowed seven walks and was handed a tough break by one of the two errors the Giants made behind him.

Supporting Tex Carleton's brilliant pitching was an extra-base attack that brought them runs in five innings. Cubs romped to an 11-0 victory over St. Louis Cardinals in the final of the series in Chicago.

Gabby Hartnett's two homers, Phil Cavarretta's perfect day of a triple, three singles and a walk, and George Stainback's double and two singles featured the cannonading.

Lloyd Waner came through with a single with two out in the ninth inning, driving home the winning run in Pittsburgh's fourth successive win over Cincinnati, 7-6.

It was the 14th defeat for Chuck Dressen's Reds in their 15 meetings with the Bucs this season.

Boston Red Sox clubbed out six hits and all their runs in one inning today to make it two straight over the Yankees with a 4-3 victory here.

In Philadelphia, Bob Johnson drove in four runs with his 21st home run of the season and a single to lead the Athletics to a 5-3 victory over Washington.

Cleveland Indians nosed out Detroit 6-5 in the final game of the series between the clubs, rain halting the contest at the end of the seventh inning.

FARR GIVES LIFT TO BOXING GAME IN GREAT BRITAIN

Tommy Farr of South Wales was the first Englishman to fight for the world heavyweight championship since Bob Fitzsimmons of Cornwall dethroned Jim Corbett by a knockout in the fourteenth round at Carson City, Nev., March 17, 1897.

There have been numerous would-be British challengers between the time of Fitzsimmons and Farr, but none reached as important a position in pugilism as did Tommy in the 15 round bout which he lost to Joe Louis.

In recent years these so-called English masters included Jack Peterson, Phil Scott, George Cook, Joe Beckett, and Bombardier Wells.

Aside from Farr the only ones capable of obtaining the wide recognition were Scott and Beckett.

Fighting Phil lost to Jack Sharkey on a three round technical knockout at Miami, Fla., Feb. 27, 1930. Although the achievement was not impressive it earned for Sharkey a futile title engagement with Max Schmeling a few months later.

Joe Beckett received some attention when he stopped former Champion Tommy Burns in the seventh round in 1920, but he went the way of most of his predecessors from the British Empire since the advent of fighting with gloves and ended his career on his back.

However, it was not always so, for England is the cradle of fighting. A generation ago fights were held under conditions prescribed by Lord Lonsdale, one of the most popular sportsmen in Britain. Moreover, rules under which boxing is conducted today were provided by another famous Englishman, the Marquis of Queensbury.

.22 CANADIAN BISLEY BEGINS SEPTEMBER 15

Meet To Last For One Month—1,700 Clubs To Participate

TROPHIES

Provincial & Dominion Championship Teams Will Be Decided

MONTREAL, Sept. 11—What may very well be called the Great Canadian .22 Bisley is about to get under way for Provincial and Dominion Championships. From Sept. 15 to Oct. 15 representative teams from some 1,700 sporting rifle clubs scattered all over Canada will enter the 1937 Dominion Championships. 22 Sporting Rifle Championship Competition to be shot on a 20 yard expert target.

These clubs are almost entirely made up of boys and young men who until the advent of organized shooting under aegis of Dominion Marksman spent both their time and their ammunition in taking pot shots at tin cans, gophers, crows and very possibly the odd stray cat. Now, from the great unknown hosts of .22 rifle addicts in every city, town and village in Canada will arise a championship team which will be judged on the best targets turned in.

This competition is open to teams with a minimum of five and a maximum of seven men and (or) women from any rifle group in the Dominion registered with Dominion Marksman. Competitors must be bona fide enrolled members of the group for which they shoot, and no competitor may represent more than one group. Where groups enter more than one team, competitors may fire for one team only in each match. Team captains may, however, switch their personnel for other matches if they so desire.

Trophy to be Awarded

A trophy will be awarded to the team from each province making the highest aggregate score in the three matches. This will be a perpetual trophy, and will be held for one year by the team winning it. The trophy itself will be an attractive silver maple shield.

At the conclusion of the three matches, the provincial championship teams will shoot off for the Dominion Marksman Challenge Trophy, emblematic of the .22 Sporting Rifle Team Championship of Canada. This trophy, a handsome silver shield in maple leaf design, is to be held for

the period of one year. A miniature of this trophy will also be awarded to the Dominion championship team, to be its permanent property.

Individual Prizes

Individual prizes will consist of embroidered arm badges in the maple leaf design, replicas of the Dominion and Provincial championship shields, which will be awarded to the five high competitors on each of the winning Provincial and Dominion teams.

Any number of teams may be entered by any one group. Each team will consist of a maximum of seven competitors, but only the five high scores will be counted for the team total. Clubs, however, must return all targets after each match under penalty of disqualification.

Each member of a provincial championship team shooting in the Dominion championship match must have shot for that team in the provincial match. Unless more than one team is entered from a province, there will be no decision for the championship of the province; but the team entered may compete for the Dominion championship.

APPROACHING FOUR CHAMPIONSHIP FIGHTS CONSIDERED A NATURAL

Mike Jacobs Crazy Like a Fox When He Signed Up Quartet of Titleholders To Defend Their Crowns Sept. 23rd.

Considered somewhat foolish for taking the financial flier he did when he first arranged the Carnival of Champions, featuring our title fights at the Polo Grounds on Sept. 23. Promoter Mike Jacobs it now appears, is as dumb as a fox.

The 'we-boys' figured Jacobs would go overboard when he shelled out no less than \$182,000 in guarantees weeks before a ticket was even placed on sale.

Now, much to the astonishment of everyone, it develops that 'Uncle Michael has a natural sell-out on his hands, which should gross more than \$400,000 and assure him a profit of approximately \$200,000 on his venture.

Lou Ambers, lightweight champion, and his formidable Puerto Rican challenger, Pedro Montanez are grabbing off the biggest take. The Herkimer Pisan is contracted to receive \$60,000 while Montanez will take down \$40,000. Barney Ross, 147 pound boss, is in for the third biggest cut, and is getting \$35,000 to defend his crown against Ceferino Garcia, who will receive \$5,000.

Marcel Thil, the 'Bald Eagle' of France, and recognized middleweight ruler of Europe, will pick up the neat sum of \$22,500 for his rumpled with Fred Apostoli. The erstwhile Frisco bell-hop will be rewarded with \$5,000 for merely answering the call 'front' to take care of M. Thil.

Last but not least on the list is Sixto Escobar, king of the bantam roost. The popular Puerto Rican youngster will make his biggest touch when he helps himself to \$12,500 for

placing his bauble on the block against Harry Jeffra. The latter is getting \$2,500, or chicken feed in comparison to the others.

Within two weeks after announcement of the show had been made, Jacobs was flooded with requests for tickets from every part of the country. Several days before he even started allotting the tickets, the head of the 20th Century Sports Club had reservations for more than 15,000 ringside seats at \$16.50 per copy.

Arrangements have been made to accommodate 80,000 spectators at the festival. With prices at the ball park ranging from \$2.30 to \$16.50, Promoter Jacobs has scaled the house to do approximately \$600,000 at a complete sell-out. And it may even hit that figure judging by the heavy demand for tickets.

In addition to grabbing off a heavy chunk of the profits, for his troubles the promoter will also develop two, possibly three other natural matches for the indoor season when he takes over operations in the Garden starting next month.

There is a strong possibility that Jacobs will pair the winner of the Ambers-Montanez row with the victor of the Ross-Garcia shindig. And another fuss Jacobs is eager to arrange would show Henry Armstrong with either Ambers or Montanez, and he also has his hooks out for a fight between the winner of the Thil-Apostoli scrap with Freddy Steele to determine an actual head of that class.
