SUNDAY SCHOOLS CLOSED
All Sunday School Services in the city churches have been cancelled for the present as a result of the ban laid down by the provincial Department of Health to combat the spread of infantile paralysis. A special Sunday school service will be broadcast at 2.30 tomorrow afternoon by the Ministerial Association.

DEAN RETURNS
Very Rev. Dean Moorhead returned this week from Halifax, where he attended the Anglican Synod held there. He will officiate at the evening service tomorrow.

CABINET MEETS NEXT WEEK
It is expected that a meeting of the provincial cabinet will be held next week. Hon. A. A. Dysart, K.C., Premier and Minister of Public Works, will return to the city early in the week.

STOLEN CAR REPORTED
The car belonging to Hon. A. C. Taylor, Minister of Agriculture, which was stolen on Thursday has not been reported as yet according to R.C.M.P. Back roads between here and Saint John have been closely searched, and although it is quite certain that the car was taken in that direction, no trace of it has been found.

LOCAL MOUNTIES WIN TROPHY

RAIN ABATES FOREST FIRE DANGER

Gales Today, Sunday, All Over N. B.

Two New Flareups, Both in Charlotte Co., Make Total 14 Burning.

A steady rain falling from a slate colored sky today brought relief to forestry officials, timber owners and farmers alike in central New Brunswick. For the first time in many weeks moisture fell which was not classed as a local shower, and to all appearances the greater portion of the tremendous forest fire danger which has threatened in this section of the province for the last two months is now past.

Weather reports stated that gales with rain will be prevalent in most parts of New Brunswick today and tomorrow, with strong southwest winds.

Two new fires were reported last night to the office of G. L. Miller, chief forester for New Brunswick, making the total number of blazes now burning in the province fourteen counting the big blaze at Little Kedron Lake and the two smaller auxiliary fires as one flareup. Flames are reported in Charlotte county between St. George and Lettie, believed to have started last night. The other new outbreak is at New River in the same county.

Begun from Camp Fire
The latter blaze, which is west of the New River Station on the Canada Pacific Railway, is thought to have been started through the carelessness of an identified man with his campfire. Police are investigating the blaze today, stated Mr. Miller. According to latest reports, the fire had jumped the railroad track and progressed over a mile into Crown-owned timber.

No word has been received from the fire at Alward Brook, on the Chipman sub-division of the Canadian National Railways. A crew of men with two pumps and about 6,000 feet of hose was battling the blaze last night. The fire is on Crown land.

All is quiet on the Kedron Lake front, it was reported here last night by the Assistant Chief Forester J. Edwin Hall. Mr. Hall, who is directing the efforts of the fire fighters in that area, left Fredericton this morning to return to the scene of the blaze.

The fires at Magundy, Lepreau, Penobscus and Campobello Island were all believed to be under control today.

Rain falling at Saint John today is expected to put an effective damp. (Continued on Page Four)

SIX NEW CASES OF POLIOMYELITIS SINCE FRIDAY

Six additional cases of infantile paralysis, all of the mild type, have been reported from Saint John since press time yesterday, to Dr. William Warwick, chief medical health officer for New Brunswick. The total number of cases in New Brunswick is now 39, and in the City of Saint John 15, with four more cases in Saint John county outside the city, and five in Rothesay.

Although several persons in this district who have been suspected of contracting the disease have been visited by the District Medical Health Officer, Dr. J. M. Cameron, there have been no new cases in York County. Only one case has been reported here during the entire outbreak, that of a ten year old boy at Boiestown, who contracted the disease over a week ago.

Local church authorities will co-operate to the fullest extent with the provincial Department of Health in keeping children under sixteen from attending church and Sunday School. Plans are now underway to broadcast the Sunday School services through the facilities of the local radio station.

Hon. A. C. Taylor to Open Exhibition This Evening

Excellent Program Scheduled For Tonight—The Biggest Exhibition Ever, Predicts C. L. Sypher—Fish and Game Assn. Exhibit Outstanding.

The grand opening of the Fredericton Exhibition in the main building this evening is expected to be the most largely attended in years. Roy W. Smith, president of the exhibition will preside, while Hon. A. C. Taylor, Minister of Agriculture will officially open the big show. W. G. Clark, M.P., and His Worship Mayor G. Willard Kitchen will also give addresses at the opening ceremony. Mayor A. J. McEvoy of Devon and Mayor P. G. Long of Marysville are also expected to be present.

An entertainment featuring local talent will be another feature of the opening. The York Regiment Band, under the direction of Prof. E. Harrison Wade, will be first on the program, offering the anthem, "O Canada." The Fredericton Male Chorus will render two numbers. A tap dancing exhibition by Violet Darlington, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. George Darlington of this city, will follow the speech by His Worship Mayor Kitchen. Solos by Donald Pringle and Ronald Lawrence will also be featured on the program.

Midway Here Sunday
The Midway will not arrive until Sunday afternoon, being engaged at Saint John until midnight Saturday. The exhibition will be in full swing on Monday evening, it being a rule of the exhibition that the Midway must be set up by 11 a. m. on Monday.

A great percentage of the exhibits have come in today, while many will be entered this evening. Much of the livestock will come in tomorrow and Monday, as well as other exhibits which circumstances will not allow to be on hand.

Biggest Fair In History
There is every indication that this year's exhibition will be one of the greatest in the history of the fair from many different viewpoints. C. L. Sypher, secretary of the exhibition, today stated that the fruit exhibit especially will surpass all those of former years. A much greater interest has been taken by fruit growers this year, he stated, and a beautiful display of fruit is on hand.

In livestock and other phases of agricultural exhibition a marked improvement will be noted, he said. Many exhibitors of live stock who have never before entered in the competition have registered this year.

N. B. Fish and Game Assn.
The exhibit of the New Brunswick Fish and Game Protective Association this year is one of the finest specimens and most interesting displays that has ever been seen in the province. Live trout and salmon swim about in pools realistically covered with moss and greens. A babbling brook complete with water-fall sweeps from between green clad hills.

Other specimens of wild life are on hand, ranging from deer and moose to the humble "Porky" Porcupine. This attraction utilizes the greater part of the floor space of the Transportation Building, making it necessary to show the poultry and produce exhibits on the second storey of the building.

AGRICULTURIST LEAVES
John Moynan, Central Experimental Station, Ottawa, chief of the illustration stations in the Dominion, left for his home yesterday via Moncton, after having completed a tour of the stations in this part of the province.
